

THE HOUSEKEEPER.

Soft Ginger Bread, very nice.—Four teacups of flour, two cups of molasses, half a cup of butter, two cups of buttermilk, a cup of thick cream, three eggs, a table-spoonful of ginger, and the same of saleratus. Mix them all together, with the exception of the buttermilk, in which the saleratus must be dissolved, and then added to the rest. Bake in a quick oven.

Currant Cake.—Take one pound of flour, three fourths of a pound of sugar, half a pound of butter, a glass of rose water, four eggs, and half a teacup of currawood seed the materials to be well rubbed together and beat up; drop them on tin sheets from a spoon, and bake twenty or thirty minutes in rather a slow oven.

Very nice Loaf Cake.—One pound of flour, three eggs, one cup of sugar, one of butter, one pound of raisins, half a pound of currants, two teacupfuls of rose water, nutmegs, one cup of cream, and one spoonful of saleratus.

Currant Cake.—One cup of butter, two of sugar, three eggs, one cup of milk, half a teacupful of saleratus, a little grated nutmeg, and a cup of currants.

Cheese Cake.—Three pounds of flour, one of butter, one of sugar, three eggs, two spoonfuls of cloves; mix it with molasses and bake.

Chicken Pie.—Cut your chicken, parboil it, season it on the pot, take up the meat, put in a flour thickening, and scald the gravy; make the crust of sour milk made sweet with saleratus; put in a piece of butter or lard the size of an egg; cream is preferable to sour milk, if you have it. Take a large tin pan, line it with the crust, put in your meat and pour in your gravy from the fat; make it nearly full, cover it over with crust, and leave a vent; bake in a modern oven two hours and a half.

Rhubarb Pie.—Pull the rhubarb from the roots instead of cutting it; peel off the skin from the stalks, and cut it into small pieces, put them in the pie with plenty of brown sugar; cover the pie and bake, like apple, in a deep dish.

AGRICULTURAL.

Unruly Milch Cows. It is no wonder some cows are fractious, they are treated so roughly. Why kick, pound and bang at them? It only makes matters worse. It makes the timid ones shyer, and the spirited ones ill-natured. We urge kindness not only as a matter of humanity, but of profit and patriotism—aye, profit to your heart, profit to your pocket, profit to your country. It is vain to try and whip or frighten a cow into quietness and docility. So treated, she dreads and hates to see the milk pail and stool coming, and will prepare herself for a battle. How can she stand patiently and give down milk, while expecting to receive hard thumps.

Suppose her to be treated kindly—a little salt or some other relish given to her a few times, kind and soothing words spoken, and a little caressing with the hand. If somewhat restless as first, keep your temper and follow her up with daily kindness. The result will surely come. She will soon know what to expect from her milker, and will show her likings by unmistakable signs. No person who cannot control his passions, and speak low, and be always gentle, should be allowed to milk a cow. It is of importance, too, to milk at regular hours. There should seldom be a change of milkers.

A successful dairyman once observed to an agricultural editor, that one of the secrets of his success lay in the kind treatment he gave his cows. They were driven to and from the watering place leisurely. No dogs were allowed to distress them. No hired man was suffered to beat or to scold at them; whoever did so, was discharged at once. The cows were well fed and were allowed to take their own time in all their movements especially in warm weather. Being so treated, and milked regularly and clean, he believed that from fifty to a hundred more pounds of cheese could be made per season from each cow, than if they had been kicked and frightened, and otherwise roughly handled.
