KILLED.—Among the killed in Company C, 49th Pa. Regiment, in the recent battles before Richmond, is Edwin W. H. Diehl, son of Magdalena Diehl, lately of Union, now residing in Brown township. He was quite young, and his death is no doubt a sad blow to a mother whose husband is also in the service under Captain Bigelow.

Correspondence of the Gazette. Camp of the 46th, Pa. Vol., Culpeper, Va., July 23d, '62. Mr. Editor.—The 46th Penna. Regiment, of which the Logan Guards are members, are at this moment stationed at this place, but as tomorrow's sunset may find us more than any member thereof can conjecture at this writing.

On Sunday the party visited the different Sabbath Schools, and Rev. Mr. Talmadge (who accompanies them) delivered an excellent sermon in the Lutheran church, which, with appropriate hymns sung with great power, were listened to with pleasure and profit by a full congregation.
