The following order accompanied "Rapids'" letter last week. Head Quarters Cav. Brigade, 3d Army Corps, Camp near Culpeper, Va., Aug. 13, 1862. ORDER NO. 29.

I. The General commanding takes pleasure in announcing to the Brigade his satisfaction with its conduct whilst under the fire of the enemy, and he is proud to say that it met with the applause of all who saw it.

II. The coolness and conduct of Company C, 1st Penna. Cavalry, in covering the retreat of Friday deserves the thanks of the Commanding General. Corporal Christian Romick, who was wounded, will be recommended for promotion for his gallantry.

Whist in the charge of Major Falls' Battalion, the gallant and cool conduct of Captains Taylor and McDonald, Lieuts. McEwen, Lasla, and the brave though unfortunate Britcher alike deserve the applause of all.

III. The capture of 20 of the enemy by Capt. Janeway, of Lieut. Col. Karg's command, on his daring reconnaissance, was a well executed manoeuvre; and he has the thanks of the General commanding; whilst the conduct of Captain Broderick and his command can never receive sufficient thanks.

IV. The charge of the 1st Battalion, of 1st Penna. Cavalry, upon the enemy's lines gallantly led by Major R. J. Falls, under the order of Major General Banks, was bravely executed, and the General commanding would remind the men that in a charge the safest as well as the most honorable plan is close to the enemy, with pressing spurs and ready sabre.
