August 21st, 1852. At 5 o'clock on Tuesday evening we were ordered to strike tents in Camp Curdin, and in an hour's time the regiment was on its way to Washington City. We traveled in common truck cars with benches in them, and it was the roughest road I ever | Hoffman H. C. passed over. We started from Camp Cur- Hesser J. We left Baltimore at 7 o'clock a. m., and got into Washington at 2 p. m., and got dinner—a Kaufman J. A. mighty hard dinner it was. The regiment Longwell S. T. then formed and took up line of march for Arlington, through a boiling sun and dust shoe top deep; speaking of dust, I may here say, the dust was so deep that we could ardly see the platoon in front of us. We halted at the Long Bridge, and there the men broke ranks to get water-I myself being nearly thirsted-after which we crossed the bridge. And we are now encamped in an apple orchard which is leaded with fruit, and belongs to the Government, being confiscated. There are forts all around us, and in the morning and evening we can hear the booming of the 69 pounders, which makes the earth fairly tremble.
