Keeping Grapes.—Into the bottom of a small keg or nail cask put a layer of grape leaves fresh from the vines. On these carefully place a layer of sound, ripe, dry grapes, then leaves and grapes in alternate layers, till the keg is full. Head up the cask, and bury it in some well drained ground, below the depth of the frost. Like other things excluded from the light and air, they will change rapidly on ezposure, and hence, when a keg is opened and they are found good, use them freely

Preventing the Fracture of Glass Chimneys .- The glass chimneys which are now in such extensive use, not only for oil lamps, but also for the burners of oil and call gas, very frequently break, and not only expose to danger those who are near them, but occasionally very great expense and inconvenience, particularly those who are resident in the country. The breaking of these glasses very often arises from knots in the glass, where it is less perfectly annealed, and also from an inequality of thickness at their lower end, which prevents them from expanding uniformly by heat. The evil arising from inequality of thickness may be cured by making a cut with a diamond in the bottom of the tube.

Sweet Pickled Quinces .- The most common uses of quinces is as sweet preserves. They also answer a good purpose when sliced up and mixed in small quantities with apple sauce, giving the whole a pleasant, aromatic flavor. They make a good pickle, also. Boil in vinegar with sugar, and add cloves, cinnamon, &c., to suit the taste. The best way is to pare and quarter them and cut out the cores. Boil 10 pounds of fruit, adding 5 pounds of sugar, and about 4 pints of vinegar, one ounce of stick cinnamon, and 11 ounce of cloves. When well boiled, put in a jar and pour over the syrup.

Also, by the 18th section of this Act, it is enacted that when two or more Counties shall compose a District for choice of a member or members of the Senate of this Commonwealth, or of the House of Representatives of the United States or of this Commonwealth, the Judges of the election in each County, having met as aforesaid, the Clerks shall make out a such election, within the County, for every person voted for as such member or members, which shall be signed by said Judges and attested by the Clerks, one of the Judges shall take charge of such certificate and shall produce the same at a meeting of one Judge from each County, at such place in such Pistrict as is or may be appointed by law for that purpose, which meeting shall be held on the seventh day after the election, being for the present year, Tuesday, 31st day of October next. The Congressional Judges of the House of Cambria, Blair, Huntingdon and Mifflin, will therefore meet at the Court House in Hollidaysburg, Blair county, on Tuesday, the 21st day of O


