

THE HOUSEKEEPER.

How to Make Home Brewed Ale.

G. Burton, in the Rural New Yorker, gives his method of making home brewed ale as follows: The art of brewing is very easy to be understood, for it is exactly similar to the process of tea making. Put a handful of malt in a tea pot; then fill it with water—the first time rather under boiling heat. After it has stood some time, pour off the liquor just as you would tea, and fill up the pot again with boiling water. In a similar manner pour that off, and so go on filling up and pouring off until the malt is tasteless, which will be the case when all its virtue is extracted—the liquor of malt tea must then be boiled with a few hops in it, and when it becomes cool enough—that is, about blood heat—add a little yeast to ferment it, and the thing is done. This is the whole art and process of brewing; and to brew a large quantity requires just such a mode of proceeding as it would take to make a tea breakfast for a regiment of soldiers. A peck of malt and four ounces of hops will produce ten quarts of ale, and of a better quality than can be purchased.

Suiciden Pudding—One half pound beef suet shred very fine and small, one-half of a pound of brown sugar, one-half of a pound of bread crumbs, two tab-spoon-fuls of orange marmalade, three eggs, raisins round the mould. To be boiled three hours; wine sauce.

Corn Griddle Cakes—Almost every one is interested in knowing how to make corn cakes most palatable, since so much more of it will be used in these straitened times. The following is said to be an excellent receipt: Scald at night half the quantity of meal you are going to use, mix the other with cold water, having it the consistency of thick butter; add a little salt and set it to rise; it will need no yeast. In the morning the cakes will be light and crisp.

Rock Cream—This will be found a very ornamental as well as a delicious dish for a supper table. Boil a teacupful of the best rice till quite soft in new milk, sweeten it with powdered loaf sugar, and pile it up on a dish. Lay on it in different places square lumps of either currant jelly or preserved fruit of any kind; beat up the whites of five eggs to a stiff froth, with a little powdered sugar, and flavor with either orange flower water or vanilla. Add to this, when beaten very stiff, about a table-spoonful of rich cream, and drop it over the rice, giving it the form of a rock of snow.

Premium Corn Bread—Scald a pint of Indian meal, add to it a pint of sponge, half a teacup of molasses, small teaspoon saleratus, stir in flour with a spoon until quite stiff, put in pan, let it rise, and bake it one hour.

To Dress Celery—Beat up well one yolk of egg; add two table-spoonfuls of cream, one of white sugar, three of vinegar, a teacupful of olive oil, one of made mustard, and a pinch of salt. Cut the celery into bits, and add the rest.

Sponge Cake—Nine eggs, their weight in sugar, the weight of five in flour, and the juice and peel of a lemon.

Lady Cake—A pound of sugar, one of flour, a half pound of butter, the whites of sixteen eggs. Rub the butter and sugar to a cream, add a little of each of the eggs and flour alternately.

Green Apple Pies—Grate raw six good apples, add a cup of sugar, three table-spoonfuls of melted butter, four eggs, a little lemon juice, two table-spoonfuls of brandy, a few dried currants, a little spice. Line plates with a paste, fill and bake without an upper crust.

Notice to Collectors of Taxes.

THE Commissioners have adopted the following regulations respecting Collectors of Taxes:

1st. That the Treasurer be and is hereby directed, on the 6th day of April, 1864, to charge interest on all balances due by collectors of State and county taxes for 1860, 1861 and 1862—in each case charging interest from Wednesday of the April court following the year of the issue of the duplicate—and on the 1st of May next to add similar interest to all outstanding taxes for 1863.

2d. That the treasurer is hereby directed, on Wednesday of April court of each year to add interest on all outstanding balances on duplicates for the previous year.

3d. That the Treasurer furnish the commissioners, at the times above designated, with the several amounts due by collectors.

MEN WANTED FOR THE INVALID CORPS.

ONLY those faithful soldiers who, from wounds or the hardships of war, are no longer fit for active field duty will be received in this Corps of Honor. Enlistments will be for three years unless sooner discharged. Pay and allowance same as for officers and men of the United States infantry; except that no premium or bounties for enlistment will be allowed. This will not invalidate any pensions or bounties which may be due for previous services.

For the convenience of service, the men will be selected for three grades of duty. Those who are most efficient and able bodied, and capable of performing guard duty, etc. will be armed with muskets, and assigned to companies of the First Battalion. Those of the next degree of efficiency, including those who have lost a hand or an arm; and the least effective, including those who have lost a foot or leg, to the companies of the Second or Third Battalions; they will be armed with swords.

The duties will be chiefly to act as provost guards and garrisons for cities; guards for hospitals and other public buildings; and as clerks, orderlies, &c. If found necessary they may be assigned to forts, &c.

Acting Assistant Provost Marshals General are authorized to appoint Officers of the Regular Service, or of the Invalid Corps, to administer the oath of enlistment to those men who have completely fulfilled the prescribed conditions of admission to the Invalid Corps, viz:

1. That the applicant is unfit for service in the field

2. That he is fit for the duties, or some of them, indicated above.

3. That, if not now in the service, he was honorably discharged.

4. That he is meritorious and deserving

For enlistment or further information apply to the Board of Enrollment for the district in which the applicant is a resident.
