Early Ground Work.

As soon this month as the frost is out of the ground, peas can be sown, of the extra early and early frame varieties. They should be sown rather shallow. They are a hardy plant, and will stand some freezing, and are sometimes seen poking their noses through the snow quite unharmed. Cauliflowers should be now transplanted in the hotbed, and not a day should be lost. Onions can be set whenever the ground is fit. In warm borders, parsnip, horned carrot, long scarlet radish, celery, cabbage and spinach seed can be sown about the middle of the month. Rhubarb, to get a supply at once, should be set out by separating the roots. So with horse radish; but a little of the crown of the root should be attached to each piece. These are perfectly hardy and can be set out at once.

All the trash in the garden that was not cleared off last autumn or winter, and is unfit to convert into manure, including the raspberry, blackberry, rose, shrubbery and grape prunings, should be gathered up in heaps and on calm days burned. The rose bushes should have all the old and dead wood removed, and the rest considerably shortened if overgrown. Shrubby also should be thinned out where spreading too much at the bottom, and shortened in, especially where space is valuable.

Those who desire the autumn crop, only, of the Catawissa Raspberry, should remove all the vines close to the ground. As soon as the new shoots are two or three inches high, a good mulching of stable-yard manure is excellent. After they reach a foot or eighteen inches, a mulching of grass, straw, garden rakings, &c., should be applied once or twice during the season. Raspberries, blackberries, gooseberries, &c., require a loose, rich, moist soil, and this is the way to provide it. New asparagus beds can be prepared now whenever the ground is in order. For this purpose roots, one, two and three years old are generally used. We however prefer to plant the seed, which should be covered about two inches, and planted from two to three inches apart, in hills a foot apart each way. Three seeds should be allowed to a hill, and stuck in a triangular form, thus ** Planting the seed instead of the roots, will produce better plants and afford a supply of asparagus just as early.—Germantown Telegraph.

Clear up the Front Yard.

A pleasant home should never have an unpleasant approach. In the general clearing up in spring, do not forget to put the front yard to rights. We do not advocate anything stiff, formal, or expensive. Straighten up and repair the fence. Remove everything from the yard that does not belong there. Have a good walk from the gate to the front door, not one that is sunken below the general level and always flooded in rains; but let it be a little raised so as to be passable in all weathers. Have some flower borders by all means, but if there is unfortunately neither time nor taste for these, have grass and some trees and shrubs, not set in stiff rows, but dotted here and there. Then get a Virginia creeper (American Woodbine) or wax work vine from the woods, and run it over the porch, if there is one, or if not, run it upon the door. A climbing rose may be easily obtained and will be very beautiful when in bloom. A small amount of work and a little taste will make even a humble house look attractive and homelike.—American Ag.

UNITED STATES Internal Revenue.

ANNUAL TAXES FOR 1864.

THE attention of tax-payers is hereby called to the provisions of the United States Excise Law relative to the assessment of annual taxes.

By the sixth section of the act of July 1, 1862, it is made the duty of all persons, partnerships, firms, associations, or corporations, made liable to any annual duty, license, or tax, on or before the first Monday of May in each year, to make a list or return to the Assistant Assessor of the District where located of the amount of annual income, the articles or objects charged with a special tax, and the business or occupation liable to pay any license.

Every person who shall fail to make such return by the day specified will be liable to be assessed by the Assessor according to the best information which he can obtain; and in such case the Assessor is required to add fifty per centum to the amount of the items of such list.

Every person who shall deliver to an Assessor any false or fraudulent list or statement, with intent to evade the valuation or enumeration required by law, is subject to a fine of five hundred dollars; and in such case the list will be made out by the Assessor or Assistant Assessor, and from the valuation and enumeration so made there can be no appeal.

Payment of the annual taxes, except those for licenses, will not be demanded until the thirtieth day of June.

The appropriate blanks on which to make return, and all necessary information, will be furnished by Joseph Milliken and Robert Sterrett, Assistant Assessors for the 15th and 16th Divisions, to whom the returns should be delivered on or before the first Monday of May, at their offices.

- 1st. That the Treasurer be and is hereby directed, on the 6th day of April, 1864, to charge interest on all balances due by collectors of State and county taxes for 1860, 1861 and 1862—in each case charging interest from Wednesday of the April court following the year of the issue of the duplicate—and on the 1st of May next to add similar interest to all outstanding taxes for 1863.
- 2d. That the treasurer is hereby directed, on Wednesday of April court of each year to add interest on all the outstanding balances on duplicates for the previous year.
- 3d. That the Treasurer furnish the commissioners, at the times above designated, with the several amounts due by collectors.
- 4th. That no exonerations will hereafter be granted to collectors after the January court following the issue of the duplicate.
