BOUNTY MEETING.—A public meeting was held in the Town Hall on Monday evening—Geo. W. Wiley, esq., in the chair, and J. M. Stauber Secretary—to devise means to fill the borough's quota under the new call, which, if the Logan Guards are allowed, it is believed would not require more than about 12 men.
