THE HOUSEKEEPER.

RECIPES.

From Peterson's Magazine.

Tea Rusks.—Half a pint of new milk and one cup of hop yeast; add flour to make a butter, and set the sponge at night. In the morning, add half a pint of milk, one cup of sugar, one cup of butter, one egg, one nutmeg, and flour to make it sufficiently stiff. Let it rise, then roll it, and cut it out; let it rise again, then bake.

Molasses Cup Cake.—Two cups of molasses, two cups of butter, three eggs, one-third of a cup of cold water, and one tablespoonful of soda; then bake.

Onion Sauce.—Boil the onions until tender, changing the water occasionally to render them more mild. Strain and mash the onions in a bowl, adding butter and salt. Warm up again, and mix the whole thoroughly.

To Make a French Pudding.—Take one quart of milk, nine large table-spoonful of flour, and eight eggs. Beat the eggs very light, adding gradually to them the flour and the milk.

Apple Pudding.—Take one quart of stewed apples, one quarter-pound of butter, four eggs, some grated bread, a nutmeg, a little rose water. Sweeten to taste, and bake in puff-pans.

Notice to Owners of Unseated Lands.

At present it is impossible to tell whether certain lands are regularly assessed, as the transcripts do not give the names of warrantee. It may not be amiss to state that owners of Unseated lands are required by law to make return as above, and that on failure thereof the Commissioners are directed to add four times the amount of tax assessed thereon.

MISCELLANY

"Miscegenation" in Richmond.
The following we suspect will not be found in the Lewistown Patent Democrat:

[From the Richmond Whig of the 18th March.]
Anne Edward, alias Finn, and Ellen and Margaret Brown, three able-bodied, almost white mulattoes, were yesterday arrested by officer Ferrin—the first charged with violently abusing one James Smith, the two latter for being from Calpeper county and having no free papers. These women were arrested by our troops in Calpeper shortly after the battle of Cedar Mountain, and sent to Richmond on some charge affecting their loyalty. For a considerable length of time they were kept in Castle Thunder, and then turned out in the city. They took up their abode in an old rattletrap of a house in Exchange alley, where they have been leading loose and very disreputable lives.

When arrested yesterday, they represented themselves as the special proteges of the Government, at least of some of the Government officers here. They say they have been drawing regular rations, and sugar, coffee and molasses from the Government. If this is a fact, it is a disgraceful one. Three idle mulattoes, supported in vice and idleness by the Government, whilst thousands of our best citizens, who have been driven from their homes by the enemy, want bread for themselves and their children!

A Democratic Item.—The Vallandigham family entertain feelings of admiration, not to say love, for the negro race in general, the female sex in particular, that is incredible. The race has furnished the stock in trade and the speech-inspiring theme of the Ohio martyr for a number of years. But the younger members of the family outstrip him in their affections for the "down trodden African." Perley Vallandigham, a youth to fortune and to fame unknown, nevertheless a nephew of the great Ohio martyr, is married to and lives with a negro woman in this city. His brother on the other side of the river, is also married to a negress.—*Muscatine Journal.*

Notice to Collectors of Taxes.

1st.
