Our thanks are due to the lady managers for a fine bouquet, sundry cake, and a ticket.—Charles Robison, a well known colored man who has been residing here for a number of years, died on Thursday last, aged about 60. He was formerly a slave, owned by a family in Maryland, from whom he took French leave, and although his whereabouts was known for the past several years, no attempt was made to arrest him.—The Lutheran Sabbath schools intend holding a celebration on the picnic principle on the 4th of July.—Wm. Willis, esq., has purchased the Langton farm up the river. Mr. L. we understand contemplates going westward.—Our edition to-day is 373 quires, or exactly 900 copies. With the large accessions to our list paper bills are also increasing. A few months ago we bought a lot for \$144.50 cash, and last week laid in another stock of 20 bundles, at a cost of \$203.20, or \$10.16 per bundle. Two years ago these two lots would have cost \$144.50 less than now.—Rev. Williamson continues in a weak state, and has we believe resigned his situation as county superintendent of common schools.—We regret to note the serious illness of Major Robt. Patton.—The concert given at Newton Hamilton by the Keystone Band and Glee Club, for the benefit of the Sanitary Commission, netted \$22.35.

The weather has been quite warm since our last, and without rain. Some grass has been cut, and grain is rapidly changing color.

The business men in this place have agreed to close their stores at 8 p. m. after the 1st July.

DEFICIENCY DRAFT.—By a notice among the advertisements it will be seen that a draft is to be made on Saturday next to supply the deficiencies in several districts in this county. We do not know exactly whence these figures come, but suppose that they arise from surplusses in the first draft which were loaned to these districts and are now thrown back where they originally belonged, leaving the borrowers to make them up. It is a matter of much regret that those who have these things in charge at Harrisburg or Washington cannot devise some mode by which such annoyances may be avoided, and a definite number for each district at once fixed, as it is by no means pleasant to be told after a draft has already been made to fill a quota that another is necessary! We hope some member of Congress will present this matter to the President and see whether this "after-clap business" cannot be stopped hereafter.

The stage from Bellefonte was upset one day last week near Centre Hall, and some of the passengers, (among whom were Rev. Mr. Fleck and some other Lutheran preachers who had been attending a meeting of Synod,) considerably bruised. A young girl, who made her living by sewing, had her arm badly broken. The horses we learn were driven by a mere boy, who showed himself totally incapable of managing a team.

THE RELIEF FUND. FOR the information of all concerned, the following regulations are made public: 1st. In all cases a certificate of being credited to some district in Millin county must accompany the application. This must be in writing, either from the Adjutant General's office, from a mustering officer, or a bounty committee. 2d. The application must state, by endorsement at the head or on the back the name of the soldier, his company and regiment. 3d. Two or three men ought not to act for an entire borough or township in signing the certificate of recommendation as deserving the relief. 4th. Twelve weeks pay, in three monthly orders, is given, when all recent applications are discontinued. If a renewal is asked for, the parties must apply to the Board of Relief in person, or show positive evidence that they are in need. Justices of the Peace, bounty committees, and all others making promises to soldiers or their families, will govern themselves by the above regulations, as I shall hereafter pay no attention to applications unless they conform to them, but file them away for action by the Board of Relief. Where the papers are all right or approaching the proper form, there is no difficulty in being placed on the list for twelve weeks, but so many of late have been informal—in many cases leaving me to hunt up the necessary evidence of credit, &c.—that I am compelled to ask for more care.
