Apple Cheese .- Take equal weights of apples and sugar; boil the sugar in water, take off the scum as it rises, and when it is clear, put in the apples with some lem on-juice and peel, and boil until it is all of a proper thickness.

A Cream for this Cheese .- To a pint of cream or new milk put the yolks of two eggs, a stick of cinnamon, a spoonful of rose-water, and the peel of a lemon; let it quite boil, and when it is cool, sweeten it to your taste, and pour it over or around the cheese.

Tea Cake. - The requisite are one pound of flour, balf a pound of butter, half a pound of sugar, the yolks of three eggs, some caraway seeds, and a little nutmeg. Make all into a stiff paste, divide this into flat cakes, and bake them upon tins.

Canterbury Pudding .- Half a pound of beef suet cut fine, half a pound of grated bread, half a pound of powdered loaf sugar, the juice of one lemon and its rind grated fine, three eggs, and a large wineglass of brandy; to be boiled an hour and three quarters, and to be served up with pudding-sauce.

Any failure upon the part of the maker of an instrument to appropriately stamp it renders him
