turns of said election.

I also make known that, by an act entitled an "Act relating to the elections of this Com onwealth,' approved the 11th day of April. 1852, it is provided that 'Every year in which the citizens of this Commonwealth shall vote for Electors for President and Vice President of the United States, the Assessors of the several wards, townships, incorporated districts and boroughs within this Common wealth, except within the city and county of Philadelphia, shall, at all reasonable times after the 2d Tuesday of October in said years. and until within ten days of the time fixed by law for the election of Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, on the personal application of any white freeman claiming to be assessed within the prop-er ward, township, incorporated district or borough, or claiming a right to vote therein, as being between the age of twenty one and twenty two years, and having resided in this Commonwealth one year, enter the name of such person on the list of the taxable inhabitants; and said Assessors shall, at least eight days previous to the day fixed for the eight days previous to the day fixed for the election, make out duplicate copies of the name or names so entered, and after certifying and signing the same, shall deliver one copy to the Commissioners of their respective counties, to be filed by said Commissioners in their respective office; and the other copy said Assessor shall hold and hand over, without alteration or addition, to one of the day of Anne Domini one thousand without alteration or addition, to one of the Inspectors of the proper election district, at or before 8 o'clock on the morning of the day fixed for the election of said Electors. 12th day of October, in the year of our Lord

An Act to Regulate Elections by Soldiers

in Actual Military Service. Section 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and Hot Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsulvan Teneral Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the secritor 1. Be it enacted by the Scante and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsuleana in the Commonwealth whenever any of the qualified electors of this Commonwealth shall be in any actual military service, under a requisition from the President of the United States, or by the authority of this Commonwealth, and as such, absent from their place of residence, on the days appointed by law for holding the general or Presidential elections within this State, or on the days appointed by law for holding the general or Presidential elections within this State, or on the days appointed by law for holding the general or Presidential elections, to fill vacancies, such electors shall be entitled, at such times, to exercise the right of suffrage, as fully as if they were present at their usual places of elections, in the mauner hereinafter prescribed, and whether at the time of voting, such electors shall be within the limits of this State or not; and the right of voting shall not be affected, in any manner, by the fact of the voter having been credited to any other locality.

Sec. 2. A poll shall be opened in each company, composed, in whole or in part, of Pennsylvania soldiers, at the quarters of the captain, or other officer thereof, and all electors, belonging to such company, who shall be within one mile of such quarters, on the day of election, and not prevented by order of their ommanders or proximity of the enemy, from returnating to their companies, or in any military or naval hospital, or in any ressel or navy yard, may vote at such poll, as may be most convenient for them, and when there shall be ten or more voters at any place, wooksals the unsale to attend any company poll or their proper

place of election as aforesaid, the electors present may open a poil at such place as they may select, and certify in the poil book, which shall be a record of the proceedings at said election, substantially in manner and form as hereinafter directed.

Src. 3. The poils shall be opened as early as practicable on said day, and remain open at least three hours, and, if necessary, in the opinion of the judges, of election, in order to receive the votes of all the electors, they may keep the poils open until seven o'clock in the afternoon of said day; proclamation thereof shall be made at, or before, the opening of the poils, and one hour before closing them.

Src. 4. Before opening the poil, on the day of election, the electors present, at each of the places aforesaid, shall elect, trea voce, three persons, present at the me, and having the qualifications of electors, for the judges of said election, and the judges so feeted shall then appoint two of the persons present, who shall be qualified to act as clerks of said election; and the judges shall prepare boxes or other suitable receptacle for the tickets.

Sec. 5. Before any votes shall be received, said indges and elerks shall each take an oath or affirmation, that he will perform the duties of judge or elerk, (as the case may be,) of said election, according to law and to the best of his abilities, and that he will studiously endeavor to prevent frand, deceit or abuse, in conducting the same, which oath or affirmation any of the said judges or clerks, so elected or appointed, may administer to each other; and the same shall be in writing, or partly written and partly printed, and signed by said judges and clerks and certified to by the partry administering the same, and attached to or entered upon the poll book, and there signed and certified as aforesaid.

Sec. 6. All elections shall be by ballot, and the judges of elections may, and upon challenge of any other voter shall examine, under oath or affirmation, the applicant to vote, (which oafh or affirmation a

ward, precinct, city, borough township or county of this State, in which he claims residence; and befor receiving any vote, the judges, or a majority of them shall be satisfied that such applicant is a qualified vo-

SEC, 7. Separate poll books shall be kept and separate returns made for the voters of each city or county; the poll books shall name the company and regiment and the place, post, or hospital in which such election is held; the county and township, city, borough, ward, precinct or efection district of each voter shall be endorsed opposite his name on the poll books; each clerk shall keep one of said poll books, so that there may be a double list of voters.

SEC, 8. Each ticket shall have written or printed, or partly written and partly printed thereon, the names of all the officers which may properly be voted for at said election, for which the said elector desires to vote.

ote. Sec. 9. That the judges to whom any ticket shall be Sec. 9. That the judges to whom any ticket shall be delivered shall, upon the receipt thereof, pronouce with an audible voice the name of the elector, and if no objection is made to him, and the judges are satisfied that said elector is a citizen of the United States and legally entitled according to the constitution and laws of this State to vote at said election, shall immediately put said ticket into the box or other receptable therefor, without inspecting the names of persons voted for; and the clerks shall enter the name of the elector on the poll book of his county, ward, presenct, city, borough, or township, and county of his residence, substantially in pursuance of the form hereinafter given.

Szc. 10. At the close of the polls, the number of vo-ters shall be counted and set down at the foot of the list of voters, and signed by the judges and attested by the clerks.

After the poil books are signed, the ballotbox shall be opened and the tickets therein contained shall be taken out, one at a time, by one of the judges who shall read distinctly, while the ticket remains in his hand, the name or names therein contained for the several offices voted for, and then deliver it to the second judge, who shall examine the same and pass it to the third judge, who shall string the vote for each county apon a separate thread and carefully preserve the same; the same method shall be pursued as to each taken out, until all the votes are counted.

Sec. 12. Whenever two or more tickets shall be found carefully folded or rolled together, neither of such tickets shall be counted; and if a ticket shall contain more than the proper number of names for the same office, it shall be considered fraudulent as to all the names designated for that office, but no further,

Sec. 13. As a check in counting, each clerk shall keep a tally list for each county from which votes shall have been received, which tally list shall be completed, the number of votes for each person, in the county poll books as aforesaid, shall be enumerated under the inspection of the judges, and set down as hereinafter provided in the form of the poll book.

Sec. 41. This act shall not apply to the election of members of council, or to ward and division officers in the city of Philadelphia.
