THANKSGIVING.—Tomorrow, 24th, has been appointed by both the President and Governor as a day of general Thanksgiving to God for the blessings of the past year—for the gathered fruits of the earth; for the continuance of health; for the prosperity of industry; for the preservation of good order and tranquility throughout our borders; for the victories which he has vouchsafed to us over armed traitors, and for the manifold mercies he has heaped upon us, unworthy recipients. Stores and business places in town will be closed. A union service will be held in the Lutheran church in the morning at 20 minutes before 11, consequently none of the other churches will be open. The choirs of the several congregations have combined and practiced suitable music for the occasion. A collection will be taken up, to be presented as a thank-offering to the Christian Commission. All are invited to attend.
