RECIPES.

From the American Agriculturist.

Good Nutcakes .- Mix 2 eggs, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup sweet milk, butter the size of an egg, 2 teaspoonfuls cream of tartar, 1 of soda, a little nutmeg and flour enough to roll out. Cut in rounds, making a small hole in each, then drop them into hot fat and fry to a light brown

Farmer's Cake. - Mix 1 cup of cream, 1 of sour milk, 2 of sugar, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoonful saleratus and 1 of salt with flour enough to make a good batter. This will make two fair sized cakes.

Pickling for Hams or Beef .- For each 100 lbs. of meat, take 7 lbs. coarse salt, 5 lbs. brown sugar, 2 ounces saltpeter, 1 ounce soda or saleratus and 4 gallons water. Boil and skim the mixture, let it cool, and when cold pour it upon the meat, which should be weighted to keep it down .-Leave common sized hams in pickle 4 to 5 weeks. Beef can be kept until used up, if the brine be scalded occasionally.






