#### Repeal of the State Tax on Real Estate.

The copperheads of this State will grit their teeth to learn that the Black Republicans have committed another outrage on their Constitutional feelings by repealing the tax on real estate, because, as these Black Republicans allege, the State can manage without it, at least until the heavy local taxes can be dispensed with, and possibly altogether. Szcriox I. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That from and after the passage of this act, it shall be the duity of the casaier of every bank in this Commonwealth, whiether incorporated inder the laws of this State or of the United States, to collect, annually, from every stockholder of said bank, a tax of one ber centum upon the par value of the stock held by said stockholder, and to pay the same into the State treasurer on or before the first day of July and every year hereafter, commencing on the first day of July, Anno Domini one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the said stock shall be exempt from all other taxation under the laws of this Commonwealth.

Sec. 2.
