The principal subjects of discussion during the past week have been an order issued by direction of the President to enforce military authority in the Southern States.

SCHOOL DIRECTORS CONVENTION.

The attention of the School Directors of Mifflin county is called to the following section of the School Law: Sec. 1. That the School Directors of the several counties of the Commonwealth, shall meet in Convention at the seat of Justice of the proper county, on the first Monday of June next, and on the first Monday of May, in each third year thereafter, and select *vis a vis* by a majority of the whole number of directors present, one person of literary and scientific attainments, and of skill and experience in teaching, as County Superintendent, for the three succeeding school years, and the school directors, or a majority of them, in such convention, shall determine the amount of compensation for the county superintendent.
