For the Educational Column.

To the Male Teachers of Millin County.
Gentlemen.—In my former article, I endeavored to show that your first object in life should be to secure a thorough and complete education, and second, that you should do so for the sake of education itself, holding out the idea that it would amply repay you, if not in dollars and cents, in enlarged, liberal and ennobled views of life, and of your relation to the great universe of God of which you form an important part. But to do this requires time. Therefore to the third topic, Don't be in too great a hurry about it, I call your attention briefly. We are proverbially a fast people.

This disposition manifests itself in every period and relation of life. The mother shows it in prematurely advancing the child by the dress he wears. The boy in the roundabout period grows weary of it, and longs for the long-tail frock era, chewing and smoking tobacco, driving fast horses, &c., in which he is led to believe manhood consists. The young man, seemingly with the idea of the world is desperately in need of him, takes a race through college, and, enveloped in his sheepskin ottomans, a fit covering, plunges into business making money, while as a literary man he is scarcely ever heard from. The same disposition exists in our public schools, scholars advance with undue rapidity through the book, and into higher classes. Parents are anxious for it, and teachers frequently boast of it.

The result is superficial habits of study, and dislike for it. Undue rapidity necessarily produces superficiality, and superficiality necessarily produces dislike for study; how can we love a thing whose beauties we do not see? How can we see the beauties of a thing we don't understand? Our characteristic fastness in nothing produces such bad results as in our education, but because of the knowledge we lose, but because of the habits we form. Practically, it matters little to a young man who, after having completed a course of education, designs studying theology, law, or medicine whether he has or has not a thorough knowledge of higher mathematics, but it is highly important that he shall have acquired a taste for study which, without habits of thoroughness cannot be done.

Said a college professor to a young man about graduating, "If you have succeeded in cultivating a taste for study, and forming right habits of application, you have accomplished a very important object. Your career as a student then will not cease when you receive your diploma."

Now, gentlemen, when I say 'don't be in a hurry I mean to be understood in two ways. First, don't go too fast, becoming superficial, but strive to cultivate a taste for study by being thorough. Second don't be in a hurry to cut your school days. Please take a note of this fact: no person who was a faithful student ever regretted having spent too much time and money in securing an education, while thousands have regretted they did not spend more. When the period of life is past and the wants are felt, we may regret, but that is poor comfort.

I know it is natural to desire at the expense of thorough preparation, to enter the sphere of active life at an early period. But if that desire were analyzed it would, in most cases, be found to consist largely of a selfish element, self gratification in making money. There may be cases of young men who burn so enthusiastically for an opportunity to do good, alleviate the ills of humanity, and help on the work of human redemption that they forego the advantages of a thorough preparation to gratify this desire. Such a course while the spirit of it is commendable is certainly not wise.

Aim higher than simply to make money or gain a subsistence for the physical body. Make the best of yourselves. Go to school in the summer, teach in the winter, and if, at the age of thirty, you have acquired a thorough and complete education you will be a fortunate man, and, at the age of sixty, you will have accomplished more in whatever calling or profession you may engage, than you would, if without such preparation you had commenced life five or ten years earlier.
