Those which are altered may be detected by having the wrong designs upon their backs. The following are the designs upon the backs of the genuine notes: On \$1000 notes, Washington resigning his commission; \$500 notes, Declaration of Independence; \$500 notes, Baptism of Pocahontas; \$10 notes, De Soto discovering the Mississippi; \$5 notes, Landing of Columbus, 1492; \$2 notes, Sir Walter Raleigh, 1585; \$1 notes, Landing of the Pilgrims. All National Bank Notes, the backs of which do not correspond with the above, are bogus.
