### RESTORATION!

#### The Policy of the Union Party to Restore the National Union.

"Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of in Congress assembled, two thirds of both Houses concurring, That the following article be proposed to the Legislatures of the several States as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which, when ratified by three-fourths of the said Legislatures, shall be valid as a part of the Constitu-

tion, namely:
"ARTICLE—Section 1. All persons born
or naturalized in the United States, and or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are cit-izens of the United States, and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States. Nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the

"Section 2. Representatives shall be ap portioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed; but whenever the right to vote at any election for electors of President and Vice President, or for United States Representatives in Congress, executive and judicial officers, or the members of the Legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age, and citizens of the United States, or in any way abridged, except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in that State.

"Section 3. No person shall be a Senator or Representative in Congress, elector of President and Vice President or hold any office, civil or military under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath as a member of Congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State Leg-lature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof; but Congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each House remove such disability.

"Section 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States authorized by law, including debts incurred for the payment of pensions and bounties for service in suppressing insurrection or rebellion shall not be questioned, but neither the United States nor any State, shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave, but all such debts, obligations, and claims shall be held illegal and void."

Wm. Willis and John S. Miller are pledged to vote against the ratification of the above just and equitable settlement of our national difficulties.

In accordance with the provisions of the 8th section of an act entitled "A further supplement to the Election Laws of this Commonwealth," I publish the

WHEREAS, By the act of the Congress of the United
States, entitled "An act to amend the several acts
heretofore passed to provide for the enrolling and
calling out the national forces, and for other purposes," and approved March 3d, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, all persons who have descred the
military or naval service of the United States and
who have not been discharged or indexed from the
penalty or desability therein provided, are deemed
and taken to have voluntarily relinquished and forfeited their rights of citizenship and their rights are
become citizens, and are deprived of expressing any

become citizens, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof.

And whereas, Persons not citizens of the United States are not, under the constitution and laws of Pennsylvania qualified electors of this Commonwealth: wealth:
SECTION 1. Be it enacted, &c.. That in all elections
hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be
unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballots from any person or persons
embraced in the provisions and subject to the disability imposed by said act of Congress, approved March
3d, one thousand eight hundred and say-five, and it
shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote
any bailot or ballots.

30, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot or ballots.

Secroto 2. That if any such judge and inspectors of election, or any one of them shall receive or consent to receive any such unlawful ballot or ballots from any such disqualified person, he or they so offending shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, be sentened to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment in the jail of the proper county for not less than sixty days.

Sec. 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall, at any election hereafter to be held in this commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote, a ballot or ballots, any person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwealth, shall for each offence be punished in like manner as provided in the preceding section of this act in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot or ballots.

Sec. 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade
