On Friday morning, Sept. 14th, Johnstown was visited by the most frightful accident in its history. It was appalling to the stoutest hearts. As soon as possible those who were not on the platform and those who were but did not sustain any injury, made haste to rescue the suf-ferers from the horrible pit, and to render them such assistance as was in their power. 
