Mineral Discoveries.—A few days ago we were shown a specimen of iron ore from the mines of Mr. J. W. Boodey, some four miles below Mount Union, along the Juniata river, which contained a considerable amount of gold and also some silver. Mr. Boodey's lands adjoin those of the "Sugar Valley Ore and Other Company," of which we made mention a few weeks ago. Mr. Charles V. Tracy, the gentleman who showed us the specimen, says the ore has been assayed, and proves to contain twelve dollars and eighty cents of gold and eighty cents of silver to the ton. There are said to be millions of tons of the ore; also immense deposits of other of every color, and clay suitable for making stone and china ware. —Mt. Union Times.

The lands spoken of above are located in Mifflin county, in the Sugar Valley region. The prevalence of gold and silver in rocks and earthy matter is nothing new, as some can no doubt be found in nearly every square mile in the State. The misfortune however is that it costs more to extract it than it is worth, though the above, if correct, gives more gold to the ton than is generally the case. The day we suspect will prove of more value than the gold and silver.
