Philadelphia Produce Market. PHILADELPHIA, June 23.—There is nothing doing in Clover or Timothy seed; small sales of the latter at 22 1/2 cents.

There is no movement in Querciton bark, and No. 1 is offered at 64 1/2 cents. There is a moderate activity in the flour market, and more firmness in prices for all descriptions; the sales foot up 2,000 bbls., including Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota, extra quality, at 65 1/2 cents; Pennsylvania do. at 66 1/2 cents; Indiana and Ohio, do., at 66 1/2 cents, and fancy lots at 67 1/2 cents.

There is a fair demand for wheat, and prices are maintaining at 82 cents for 3,000 bus. red, at 84 1/2 cents, and amber at 81 1/2 cents. Corn is in steady demand without change in prices, at 42 1/2 cents for 4,000 bus. at 44 1/2 cents, for yellow, 41 1/2 cents, for western mixed, and 39 1/2 cents, for mixed.

No sales of barley or malt. Whisky is firmer and held at 91 1/2 cents, tax paid.

Philadelphia Cattle Market. MONDAY, June 21.—The arrival and sale of Beef Cattle at the Avenue Drove Yard, reached about 150 head this week. The market was very dull, and prices 1/4 to 1/2 cent lower than last week, and western steers selling at 9 1/2 cents, fair to good do. at 7 1/2 cents, and common at 6 1/2 cents, as follows: 100 head sold at 40 1/2 cents for springers, and 45 1/2 cents head for cow and calf.

Sheep were rather lower; 12,000 head sold at the market yards at 4 1/2 cents, gross, as to condition.

Hogs were in fair demand at an advance; 100 head sold at 12 1/2 cents, gross, at 13 1/2 cents for slop, and 14 1/2 cents, net, for corn fed.
