Asa Packer resides in the Borough of Mauch Chunk. Every democratic paper in the State admits the fact, by parading his name, "of Carbon county." SKIES BRIGHT.

As the election approaches the prospects of the Democracy grow more gloomy. The spark of enthusiasm which was visible when Packer was nominated has been completely extinguished. That the railroad corporations and coal monopolies earnestly look for his election, in order to have the Executive influence in the approval of acts that shall make their operations still more intolerant and oppressive.

That Packer deems it necessary, in the furtherance of his prospects, to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars for the purpose of buying his election.

That to raise money for this object, he became one of a powerful agency to raise the tolls on coal, thus indirectly making the poor men of Pennsylvania contribute to the electioneering fund of their oppressor.

We learn that some of the cops in Manor township have just started, or rather attempted to start, a story that the Republicans are about to pass a law compelling the people to furnish free boarding to all the teachers in our public schools. But, as the people of Manor township are not of the kind to be reached in that way, the story is entirely harmless. Nobody outside of Berks county is stupid enough to believe it.

Mr. Geo. Dinkle, recently a soldier of the war of 1812, died at his residence near Bethesda, Martic-twp., this county, at the ripe old age of 78 years.

A very fatal disease has been manifesting itself among the poultry in the county, and it is not confined to any localities. A cotemporary states that in riding between this city and Petersburg, a gentleman "counted no less than twenty-one chickens either dead or dying in the road, while in a single yard he saw seven in the same condition." Persons purchasing cleaned poultry should be careful from whom they buy.

Mr. P. S. Blutz, of Columbia, is making arrangements for the erection of a first-class cotton mill at the Columbia dam.

The ladies of the German Lutheran Church of Columbia propose holding a fair in the Odd Fellows' Hall, commencing Monday evening next, to raise funds to liquidate the debt resting on the church.

Mr. John Weyel, of this city, has grown on his premises an immense cabbage head which weighs about 36 pounds. It is decidedly the largest cabbage head we have seen. Mr. W. thinks of exhibiting it at the County Fair this week. It is of the "Dutch Drain Head" variety.

On the morning of the 24th ult. two men entered the dwelling house of Adam F. Bair, about a mile southeast of Landisville, in East Hempfield-twp., and stole a silver watch, gold breast pin, gold finger ring, and several shirts. The thieves entered the house through a garret window and made their exit by a window in the second story. The family were absent at the time of the robbery.

The Manheim Sentinel states that Mr. Henry B. Snively, of Junction Mills, Penn-twp., raised this season a butter pumpkin of a new foreign variety, which measured fully six feet round, and weighed 120 pounds. Who can eat it?

On the evening of the 23d inst. the members of the United Brethren Church at Springville, surprised their minister, Rev. J. C. Mumma, with a large supply of flour, produce, groceries, dry goods and other articles useful in a family, worth at least forty-five dollars.

Constable Ruby, of Marietta, on Monday week, caught two very curious animals on an outline in the Susquehanna. The largest one is nearly two feet in length, about four inches in width, has four feet, which are about three inches in length, and has a head which bears a very strong resemblance to that of a cat-fish. Its tail, which is about one-third the length of the body, is very flat.
