The undersigned, Inspectors of the Lancaster County Prison, in pursuance of law, submit to the court the following report of the Prison for the year ending November 30th, 1893.

On the 30th of November, 1893, there were in confinement 97 prisoners; during the year there were received 1,685, an aggregate of the inmates of the Prison in 1893 of 1,782.
