What the Players are Doing. The amusement season is brightening up in this city. Pat Rooney's troupe is doing the New England circuit. Even the Dramatic News thinks Gilbert and Sullivan's new opera a success. Maude Granger, the actress, will shortly be married to a prominent New Yorker. Annie Pixley did a tremendous business in Pittsburgh last week.

"Enchantment" is drawing packed houses at the Globe theatre. It is the first time the walking is fearfully bad for showmen who are homeward bound. Frank Gardner, the leaper, goes with W. W. Coles circus the coming season. The prices at the opera house to-night are low enough to draw a crowded house. Manager Mishler has the Watson, Ellis and Kernell show for a two weeks' engagement. Milton Nobles will play over Mishler's circuit shortly, beginning at Scranton on January 13.

Miss Margaret Cone, the pretty little actress of last night's company, is a sister of Kate Claxton. Haverly's Mastodon minstrels opened in Brooklyn last evening. This is the first time they have been so near the metropolis. Barlow, Wilson, Primrose and West seem to be raking in as large piles as any of them this year. Plenty of troupes which are continually being organized for "the road" take the road home sooner than they expect. Frederick Leonard, of the Leonard Brothers, gymnasts, while performing at the Volks Garden, Brooklyn, fell and was badly injured. Victor Hugo has never heard of Emerson. Poor Hugo! Emerson is the best song and dance man in this country.—N. O. Peopple.

A new theatre is to be erected by an association, with a capital of \$4,000, on Fourteenth street, between Second and Third avenues, New York. Lew Simmons and his little troupe are terrifying the people of the small towns in this State. They appear in March Chunk to-night. The "Big Four" minstrel company is doing an excellent business on their trip through the state. The press speaks highly of their performance. Last week's engagement of Mr. and Mrs. McKee Rankin at the Arch Street theatre, Philadelphia, was the best that has ever been played anywhere with "The Danites." John T. Ford is said to have lost \$4,000 on Gilbert and Sullivan, but will probably make it up, as "The Pirates of Pinzance" is a success for certain. Some of the New York managers will hereafter abolish the window lithograph system, by which the persons who allow pictures to be hung in their stores, are admitted free to the theatres. Mr. Ford proposes to put "The Pirates of Pinzance" in preparation at once by Messrs. Ford & Zimmerman's opera company, and will produce it at the Philadelphia Broad Street in a fortnight. Charles H. Drew, the tenor, left the Alice Oates opera troupe before they reached this city because he had not received his salary from Manager Jack for some time past. Alice Oates's third husband, to whom she was recently married, was with her in this city. He is a young Philadelphia, who travels with the company, but does not act. Emerson, Clark and the Daly brothers have organized a travelling troupe which includes, besides themselves, Wemyss and Shannon, Parker sisters, John Hart, Cordeia and Victrola, Babbly Newcomb, Minnie Lee and several others. Lotta, while giving testimony in a St. Louis lawsuit, was asked: "What is your age?" "People might not believe me if I told," she replied. "For some of that I am 45." That was the only answer she would make. The Arnold Brothers minstrel company collapsed in New York state last week, and McCann and Holmes, the song and dance men, worked on the railroad at \$1 per day for a few days in order to provide themselves with sufficient means to pay their fares home.
