

WEATHER INDICATIONS.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—For the Middle States, clear or partly cloudy weather northwesterly winds, shifting to east and south, slowly rising temperature, and stationary or slowly falling barometer.

THE DEFENSE IN THE BRIBERY CASES ASKING FOR POSTPONEMENT.

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 21.—In the case of Salter charged with attempted bribery of members of the Legislature the defense asked for a postponement of the trial mainly on the ground of the absence of several important witnesses and the brief time allowed for the examination of the indictment. After a protracted discussion the court indicated a determination to postpone the trial till to-morrow morning, when, if the witnesses are not forthcoming, the cases be continued until March.

The court also notified the defense that they would have to plead to the indictment at once. After some discussion the attorneys for the accused agreed to plead as directed in all the cases, provided they were continued to March.

Mr. Gowen then drew up an order which all the counsel agreed to and the court should go over to an adjourned court, beginning the second Monday in March and continuing two weeks, and that there be no further continuance for any cause.

The effect of the plea of counsel for defense today is to preclude interposition of dilatory tactics.

Indicted for Perjury. True bills were found to-day against W. H. Kemble, Charles B. Salter and Jesse R. Crawford, for perjury before the House investigating committee.

CONGRESS. Senator Beck Speaks Against the Bayard Resolution. WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The Senate took up the Bayard resolution for the withdrawal of the legal tender quality of United States notes, and Mr. Beck spoke in opposition thereto.

The Porter Relief Bill. In the House majority and minority reports were made on the bill for the relief of Fitz John Porter. The bill was made the special order for Feb. 13.

The House then resumed consideration of the bill relative to national bank reserves, and Mr. Lounsbury addressed the House in favor of repealing the statutes giving United States notes legal tender quality.

The morning hour was consumed by the discussion of the bill requiring one-half of the bank reserves to be kept in gold coin.

EXPIRATION. A Negro Hanged for Murder. OSWEGO, N. Y., Jan. 21.—Daniel Seales, colored, was hanged at noon to-day, for the murder of Eldridge Reway, last June.

The culprit confessed his crime in a rambling speech. He implicated other men in his crime and said they should be with him at the halter. The drop fell at 12:14, the heart ceased to beat in eleven minutes. The aged father of the condemned witnessed the execution.

CAVING IN. A Coal Mine Breaking Down. POTTSVILLE, Pa., Jan. 21.—At 1 o'clock this morning the surface earth over the workings of Miller, Hoch & Co.'s mine at Mahanoy Plane caved in, taking with it the lot owned by Wm. O'Donnell. The earth is still cracking and is liable to sink at any moment. This is the third time that the earth has sunk over these workings, work has been stopped for several weeks past, on account of an application for an injunction to restrain the owners from taking out the coal, as it supports the surface.

TERRIBLE EXPLOSIONS. Upwards of 100 Lives Reported Lost. LONDON, Jan. 21.—It is reported that an explosion has occurred in a colliery near New Castle. The number killed is estimated from 70 to 100.

Another Dangerous Explosion. NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 21.—The sugar boiler on Carroll's plantation exploded yesterday, killing three men, and wounding thirteen others.

A SOUTH AMERICAN EPISODE. How Corporations are Treated. LONDON, Jan. 21.—A despatch from Rio Janeiro regarding the riots there of the 3d instant, says: "In consequence of levying a tax per passenger on the street car traffic the mob destroyed the cars and tracks of the company, attacked the conductors and stoned and fired on the troops; three persons were killed and thirty wounded."

MAINE. The Fusionists Ask No Questions. AUGUSTA, Jan. 21.—The Fusion House met in Union hall at 10 o'clock. A motion was made to reconsider the vote of yesterday ordering a committee to submit questions to the supreme court. It was evident from the tone of the speeches that the Fusionists have decided to submit no questions.

FIRE AT GEORGETOWN, D. C. A Flouring Mill Destroyed. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—At ten o'clock this morning a fire broke out in the large flouring mill of Hess & Cissell, near Georgetown, and in a short time the building was enveloped in flames. A general alarm was sounded. The mill burned to the ground. Loss about \$65,000.

WOMEN'S RIGHTS. Making Headway in Europe. LONDON, Jan. 21.—The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says: "The royal academy has resolved to admit women to membership, subject to certain disabilities, including the deprivation of the right to vote at elections and attendance at the annual banquet."

A NEW ORDER. A Branch for Brooklyn. LONDON, Jan. 21.—A Paris dispatch to the Times says: "Eight ladies of the order of the Little Sisters of the Poor have been sent from the parent house at Rennes to establish a branch of the order at Brooklyn, New York."

Selling Liquors by the Bottle.

Judge Junkin, of Perry county, at a recent term of the county court at New Bloomfield, cautioned innkeepers about the peril of selling liquor by the bottle over their bars. He admonished landlords that they had no right to sell a bottle of liquor to a sober man who would transfer it to one in the habit of becoming intoxicated to minors, and he was heard, as much as a druggist who dispensed poison at the call of a customer, to know who was to use the liquor. The purchase of a quart of whisky to a sober man was in itself a suspicious circumstance and raised the fair inference that it was being bought for some one to whom the landlord would not sell it. And, he added, proof of its transfer to and use by drunkards and minors was sufficient cause for revoking the innkeeper's license.
