CONKLING'S CONVENTION. The Machine in Good Running Order. UTICA, N. Y., Feb. 25.—Shortly after 12 o'clock Gen. Arthur called the convention to order.

The work of organization proceeded, attended by some confusion at times. Jake Worth was denounced by one speaker as a traitor, and amidst cries of "shame," "put him out," etc., order was restored and the proceedings went on.

The papers of contesting delegations were referred to appropriate committees. Stephen B. French, of New York, was unanimously elected temporary chairman.

It was moved that a committee of two from each judicial district be appointed on permanent organization. Carried. Mr. Forster's resolution was tabled.
