New Comers to Glean a Closely Reaped Field —The Crop of 1880.

During the past week there has been an unusually active demand for both 1878 and 1879 tobacco. Of the former not less than 400 cases have been sold at advanced figures. Of the latter it is impossible to tell how much has been secured, but a large number of buyers have been scouring the county and picking up all they can find at prices ranging from 8 cents for common up to 22 and even 25 cents for fine lots. Among the buyers are some newcomers, who, under the advice of the Tobacco Journal, have been waiting until the "insane speculators" should get through and who then intended to come into the field and take the bulk of the crop at their own prices. Alas! they waited too long, and now they are frantic at finding that the "fools" and "lunatics" have bought up almost the entire crop, and the wise and knowing ones can scarcely secure an acre of even second-rate goods without paying first-rate prices. From almost all sections of the county come reports that the growers have sold out. The few crops yet held by them are widely scattered, but are nevertheless eagerly sought by both new and old buyers. It is believed there are not 4,000 cases remaining unsold in the county, and that in two weeks from this time the purchasing season will have closed, with the crop more closely bought up then it has been for many years previous.

The receipts at the city warehouses during the week have been large, but there has not been the same rush and crush that | There is no dazzling smile or tender tale, was witnessed some weeks ago. Few of Grateful to woman's eye or ear, we know. the warehouses have received less than 50,000 pounds, while some of them have received 100,000 and 150,000 pounds respectively. In several instances there have been disputes between the growers and buyers, the latter alleging that the tobacco did not come to hand in the condition required by the contract, and the former refusing to be "docked." In a few instances where the parties could not agree, the tobacco was returned to the grower, and in one or two cases law-suits have been begun between the parties.

The mild weather of the past week has set the growers to thinking of the crop of 1880. We hear of some who have already prepared their seed beds and sowed their seeds, and many others who are giving their tobacco land a preliminary plowing up, the better to prepare it for plants when planting time shall arrive.

Nearly all the growers with whom we have conversed express an intention to plant on a larger scale than they did last year. To this increased acreage by old growers must be added the plantings of many new ones, not only in our county, but beyond its borders. With a favorable season the crop of 1880 will be the largest ever grown in the state.

To-day Gerschel & Bro, received 91,919 pounds of tobacco. Yesterday they received 10 acres from Martin Kready, for which they paid 21 cents round, which with some other lots bought by them, was among the best lots in the county.

Sam'l Gruel, the efficient foreman of Aaron Teller's warehouse, has found among the past week four quadruple leaves on single stems.

Municipal Legislation on the Chinese SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 28.—The board of supervisors at a special meeting yesterday rescinded the resolution passed at their last meeting, endorsing the action of the board of health in condemning Chinatown. The resolution of indorsement to the committee of health and police to inquire into the best methods of carrying out the measure, and the rescinding of the resolution, was based on the ground that no report had been received from the commit-

A communication was received from the mayor objecting to the recent order increasing the police force, holding that it was unnecessary. Referred to the committeee on health and police.

The rescinding of the resolution endorsing the action of the board of health will not necessarily affect action on the condemnation of Chinatown, and the board of health has full power in the premises.


