

MEMORIAL SERVICE.

Tribute to the Memory of Deceased Comrades of Post 84, G. A. R. Last evening the hall of George H. Thomas post, No. 84, G. A. R., was thrown open to the public who had been invited to be present and witness the memorial service in honor of the five comrades of the post who had died within the past fifteen months.

The hall was filled with comrades of the order and ladies and gentlemen not members of the order. The altar was covered with an American flag draped in black and white. In front of the post commander's tent were placed five vacant chairs, festooned with orange, in memory of the five deceased members.

The exercises began at 8 o'clock with a voluntary on the organ by Mr. Charles Gill and singing by the choir of the Duke street M. E. church, under the lead of Mr. H. H. Hesselt.

Past Adjutant H. C. Weidner then read the military records of the deceased comrades, namely: Walter G. Evans, Dr. A. F. Herr, Henry Scham, Reinhart Reiner and Dr. Wm. M. Whiteste. As the reading of each record was finished, the post drummer beat three rolls on a muffled drum.

The responsive memorial service was then read by the post commander and chaplain, the responses being made by the members of the post. The service was very solemn, intended to impart the lesson that all men must surely die, but that there is a sure hope of the resurrection and life eternal after death.

At the close of the responsive service the choir sang a hymn, and the comrades formed a square about the altar, and prayer was offered by the chaplain—concluding with the Lord's Prayer, repeated in concert by the comrades.

After a chant by the choir the chaplain read the 9th psalm and another hymn was sung. The memorial address was then delivered by Maj. A. C. Reinhold. It was an eloquent tribute not only to the memory of the deceased comrades, but to the different arms of the service in which they served.

Walter G. Evans was representative of the three-months men, and was one of the first to respond to the call of the president for troops to put down what was at that time regarded as little more than an insurrection. Henry Scham, of the 122d Penna. Rept., was a representative of the nine-months service, a force that was organized after the great rebellion was fully developed, and a mortal conflict was in progress between the unionists and secessionists. Reinhart Reiner, of the 75th Pa. Volunteers, was a representative of the German element of the army, than which no portion of it was more heroic or loyal, and of which Gen. Sigel and others were shining examples.

Dr. A. F. Herr was a representative of the cavalry arm of the service—a branch that, in the beginning of the war, was unjustly depreciated and regarded as comparatively little account, but which later performed invaluable services and was noted for the dash and valor of its officers and men. Capt. Wm. M. Whiteste was a representative of the three-year men, of which the great bulk of the army was composed and on whose prowess the government mainly relied for the crushing out of the rebellion, and who did not disappoint the hope and confidence reposed in them, but finally, through scenes of carnage and suffering, brought the war to a successful issue.

In the course of his address Major Reinhold sketched the personal characters of the deceased comrades and paid deserved tribute to their military services, at the same time giving a brief but succinct review of the differing circumstances under which they had entered the service and the widely different scenes through which they had passed.

Peebles, of the conservatory, four years a pupil and two a teacher at Madame Seiler's, displayed a high order of musical culture in the rendition of Rossini's "Cavatina from Semiramide;" and later in the evening sang the "Tyrolese Song" by Proch. Miss Fannie Brubaker's execution of a grand sonata from Beethoven was very superior performance; as was Miss Ella Gundaker's part in a grand duo from sonata No. 3, op. 31. Miss Peebles

and Miss Alice Troyer sang very sweetly a vocal duet, "Holy Mother, Guide his Footsteps," and the piano solos by Miss Britie Davis, of Coatesville, and Miss Lizzie McNabb—both played without notes—were most creditable performances of a high order of classical music.

Decision in Favor of the Administratrix. To-day at noon Wm. Leaman, George Nauman and E. H. Yundt, esqs., the referees who had been mutually agreed upon to decide the dispute between Mrs. Julia Rhey, the widow and administratrix of James W. Rhey, deceased, and Miss Margaret Rhey, a sister of deceased, as to which of them is entitled to the possession of a certain certificate of deposit for more than \$10,000, met in the office of Wm. Leaman, and in the presence of the parties interested rendered a unanimous decision that Julia Rhey, the widow and administratrix of James W. Rhey, was entitled to the property and certificate of deposit. That the ownership is in her, and that she is entitled to the possession of the same and the moneys due thereon.

After the referees had rendered their decision, Miss Margaret Rhey, who holds the certificate, and her attorney, Hon. Thos. P. Fenlon, refused to surrender the certificate of deposit, whereupon J. L. Steinmetz, esq., counsel for the administratrix, had issued a capias in trover and conversion.

The sheriff arrested Miss Margaret Rhey and Mr. Fenlon, her counsel, and took them before Judges Livingston and Patterson. Mr. Steinmetz, for the administratrix, insisted that the certificate of deposit should be delivered to his client, or that Miss Rhey and her counsel give bonds for their safe keeping within the jurisdiction of the court. Mr. Yundt, counsel for Miss Rhey and Mr. Fenlon, insisted on their discharge on the ground that a capias in trover would not lie. The discussion was very animated. The court made an order that the custodian of the certificate of deposit shall give bail in the sum of \$20,000, for its safe-keeping within the jurisdiction of the court.
