This announcement, taken with similar accounts from steamers preceding her, indicates an unusual eastwardly movement of the great ice drift now beginning to emerge from the Greenland seas. The ice drift is seldom met with east of the fortieth meridian, so that the berg which the Arragon sighted may be stragglers driven far beyond the Newfoundland coast by the recent high westerly winds. They may, however, be masses that have floated down from East Greenland and the Spitzbergen coasts, and in this case they indicate a general movement of Arctic ice that would make North Atlantic navigation peculiarly dangerous just now. It is considered exceptionally early in the year for ice in any quantities to be seen in February or March even nearer the Grand Banks.
