### A DRUNKEN FIGHT.

Both Combatants Badly Hurt—Complaints of Felonious Assault and Battery. Yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock a

desperate fight took place between Thomas Shields, alias Cassidy, and John Lemon, at Ziegler's tavern, on East King street, near Middle. The men are "tramps" and as nearly as we can ascertain the facts they are as follows: Shields and his wife entered the tavern, and called for beer, which they drank, and then sat down by the stove. They got into conversation with Lemon, and after talking for some time the men became noisy and began a quarrel. Ziegler interferred and put Lemon cut of the room. In a short time he came in again, made up with Shields, and the two took a glass of beer together. The quarrel was soon renewed, and Ziegler then put both the men into the ward, saying he would have no quarreling in his house. They again entered the bar-room fighting, Lemon having a pocket knife in his hand, with which he cut Shields across the face and stabbed him two or three times. Covered with blood Shields made his way to the station house, where his wounds were dressed by Dr. J. A. Fitzpatrick. The doctor found that he was cut on the left side of the head, a deep gash extending from above and behind the ear and below the angle of the jaw. He was also stabbed between the seventh and eighth ribs, about an inch below the heart. There was another stab just below the shoulder-blade and still another about two inches below. After Shields's wounds had been dressed and the blood washed from his face and body, he was placed (in a very exhausted condition ) in a cell in the lockup. About 8 o'clock it was ascertained that he had removed the bandage and torn open the wound in his side, and rup-

checked the hemorrhage and gave Shields the necessary attention. Not long after the fight Lemon appeared at Dr. Sensenigs, East Orange street, with his head and face pounded almost to a jelly and the small bone of his forearm broken near the wrist. The doctor suspecting that there had been a drunken fight sent word to police head-quarters, and Officer Leman was dispatched to arrest Lemon. He was taken to the station house, his arm was temporarily dressed,

POLITICAL DEBATE IN THE HOUSE. Garfield and Burrows Attack the Democrats and are Answered by McMahon and War

WASHINGTON, March 17 .- In the House o-day Mr. Garfield (Ohio) criticised severely the purpose of the Democratic party to refuse to appropriate for special deputy marshals, but appealed in conclusion to the Democrats to prevent the disasters which their party leaders were bringing upon the country, and expressed his belief that such a vote would be had on this bill as would set at rest the poor dregs of the extra session.

The discussion was continued by Mr. Burrows, of Michigan, who declared his conviction that the purpose of the Democratic party was to steal the next presidency, to which Mr. Springer(Ill.) retorted by charging the Republican party with stealing two or three states in the last presidential election.

Mr. McMahon replied to Messrs, Garfield & Burrows, and then Mr. Warner (Ohio) took the floor. At the conclusion of Warner's speech general debate was closed and the bill was read by sections.

ST. PATRICK'S DAY IN IRELAND, Reading a Letter from Parnell on the Sub-ject of the Land League.

London, March 19 .- At a meeting of the National Land League, in Dublin, yesterday, a letter from Mr. Charles S. Parnell was received, dated Des Moines, Iowa, March 1st, in which he says: "The general verdict of American opinions throughout the Union is overwhelmingly in favor of a radical change in the Irish land system. We shall leave behind us in America a permanent organization in connection with the Land League and prepared to support it financially and morally to any extent we may require, as such an awakening has come it to imagine."

The Lancaster Surrender Philadelphia Times.

The Republican managers of Lancaster have called a halt upon themselves in obedience to a popular demand that had got quite too loud for comfort. The county committee met yesterday, and, finding that it would smash many more heads to be knocked down that to sit down, there washentire unanimity in a formal recommendation for a popular vote on the presi-dency on the 22d of May; on delegates to he national convention, and on the next United States senator. This is a liberal concession of the ornamental part of poliics to the people; but what will be "dem total?" The Harrisburg convention has already elected the delegates to Chicago and they are known to be for Grant if Senator Cameron shall want them for Grant. It is morally certain that the Republicans of Lancaster will give an overwhelming majority for Blaine, hardly less that four or five to one, and it is in no degree doubtful that they will not ratify the delegates already chosen for Lancaster to go to the national convention. What then? The Examiner tells the story of the practical result when it sneers at allowing the people to elect "curb-stone delegates to Chicago."

This action may, however, present a graver issue for the national convention than is now anticipated. The election of new delegates by a vote of two-thirds or more and popular instructions of a decided character in favor of Blaine, coming from the Republican Gibraltar of the interior. will speak trumpet-tongued against the attempt to force the nomination of Grant by systematic defiance of the wishes of the party. Unless a local candidate shall be thrown into the senatorial contest Mr. Grow will be likely to bear off the senatorial laurels, whatever they may be worth. Secretary Quay having given notice that he isn't a candidate just yet, he will escape the tempest that a few desperate managers have provked.
