WASHINGTON, March 30.—In the Senate the bill for an exhibition in New York city in 1883 was opposed by Messrs. Carpenter and Eaton as unconstitutional, and advocated by Messrs. Kernan and Wallace. Pending debate the morning hour expired and the bill went over. Republican Senators Caucus

Washington Mar. 30.—The Republican members of the senate held a caucus this morning for the purpose of determining the party's line of action in the senate with regard to the clause inserted by the House of Representatives in "The Immediate Deficiency Bill," by which it is proposed to amend the law concerning the appointment of deputy marshals of elections. After a general interchange of opinions the caucus unanimously decided that the clause in question should be opposed by all the Republicans in the Senate, upon the ground that it is a rider upon an appropriation bill, and that all attempts of the majority to force legislation by such means should be resisted now as they were resisted at the extra session. The proceedings of the caucus occupied less than an hour and were entirely harmonious throughout.

DEATH ON A BOAT.

Endangered By Fire Not by Flood. NEW YORK, April 30 .- This morning while the crew of the police boat Seneca slept at the foot of East 17th street a fire broke out in the galley, which spread to the forward part of the boat and endangered the lives of all on board. When the outbreak was discovered the flames were beyond control of the ship's equipment and three alarms were sounded. The patrolmen and lay employees had got out of danger, when the engines arrived, with the exception of Officers Tully and Vail, who were seriously burned and were sent to Bellevue hospital The steward, Charles H. Berry, aged 23, was burned to a crisp in in his berth. The firemen immediately went to work to pump the hold free of water, but it is not probable that the board will order her to be repaired. The loss is estimated at \$5,000.


