required improvement. That, I take it, is to be measured by the amount of money the representatives of the people in councils assembled are willing to appropriate ; beyond that, no individual nor committee has a right to go.

Now, that the survey of the southern portion of the city is substantially completed, I would again earnestly recomm the opening of Dorwart street, from Manor south-eastwardly to St. Joseph or Fre-mont street. This ward, as indicated, by the number of voters it contains, must have a population of nearly 4,000. There are no avenues of inter-communication between the southern and northern portions of the ward, but three fourteen-feet-wide alleys, at wide intervals, unpaved, and in a most wretched condition during the win-

which the people must pass to get from one part to another. If Dorwart street were opened, as proposed by the new survey, it would pretty equally divide the ward, and give the people facilities for intercourse. very much needed.

In former messages I have spoken of the benefit there would be to the city of locating upon a chart our sewers, connections, size, &c. The necessity for this map becomes more apparent every day. I hope that councils will order some competent person to perform this work. We have no official record of any kind except such as the minutes of the street committee will to be gathered from former city regulators, street commissioners, contractors, and from the recollections of our citizens. The city some years ago had a map made of the water mains, showing their location, size of pipes, &c., which we find very useful in the water department.

The attention of councils is called to the fact that there will be deficiencies for the year ending May 31, 1880, of probably of ten children, seven of whom, two rom twenty-two to twenty-five thousand dollars in the street department alone. There will probably be a deficiency in the lamp department, occasioned principally by the great number of new lamps put up during the year. It will be observed that the appropriation bill introduced into place on Wednesday. councils in March, is only intended to meet

the expenses of the next fiscal year, and cannot be used for the deficiencies of this year. It is hoped that the finance committee, immediately after its organization, will proceed to the consideration of the mode of paying this floating debt. I am aware that the matter is surrounded with grave difficulties. The finance committee of last year report that the city is within Ball' of this city, Mrs Luther Stambach \$8,800 of the indebtedness allowed us under the constitution. It will be for the councils to determine the responsibility of the city for contracts made in violation of law. The creditors of the city are clamorous for payment, and we must make up our minds to provide for the payment of this floating debt or prepare to defend the city

Return of the Riot Bill Bribers. HARRISBURG, April 5.-Prison Keeper Hoffman was somewhat astonished this morning to find Salter, Petroff, Rumberger and Crawford standing upon the steps of the jail asking for admission. They were admitted and in a few minutes were followed by Sheriff Reel, Judge Pearson, District Attorney Hollinger, Geo. W. Irwin, esq., A. J. Herr, esq., and John Weiss, esq.

The bail were also promptly on hand. After a short time consumed in deliberation counsel for defense asked for the privilege to enter new bail for the appearance of their clients at court beginning April 26th, when they would appear for sentence. Judge Pearson was about to comply with this request at once when District Attorney Hollinger objected. After a discussion of the law and facts in the case, Judge Pearson, in strict accordance with Saturday's assertion, that he would treat all criminals alike in principle, admitted them to \$1,000 new bail for their appearance in court on the 26th. The old bail has been sued out this morning by the district attorney, and must be paid unless remitted by the court or the governor. The bail entered to-day is additional.
