SUFFRAGE IN RHODE ISLAND.

Shall the Electoral Vote of the State Be Diminished?

Report of the Wallace Committee Mr. Wallace submitted a report yesterday in behalf of the majority of the Senate select committee on frauds in the late elections, concerning the abridgment quotes from the federal and the Rhode Island constitutions, and shows that in Rhode Island naturalized citizens are required to possess a qualification that is not required of native-born citizens, and that this additional qualification amounts to disfranchisement. This additional qualification is the possession of real estate of the value of \$134 over and above all encumbrances or which yields a net rental

The committee reports that the estimates

of at least \$7 per annum.

of various witnesses as to the disfranchisement in Rhode Island range from 3,000 to 25,000 votes. The committee arrives at the conclusion, that, applying the rule provided in the Fourteenth amendment to the statement of facts would reduce the Republican vote of Rhode Island, under the census of 1875, in round numbers over 41,000. The committee says: "The importance of this question may be further evident when we recollect that the vote of the electoral college is based upon the representation of the states. It is possible that under the Fourteenth amendment and the act of 1873 Rhode Island might rightfully have been deprived of one representative in the House of Representatives of the XLIVth Congress, and that her additional vote in the electoral college thus secured lecided the question of the president in 1877, the vote as returned by the electoral commission being 185 to 184, and it might again decide it.'

The report declares that there is pecufiar hardship in a real estate qualification in Rhode Island, on account of the smallness of the area of the state and the density of the population. The total number of dwelling houses in the state was only 38,875 in 1875; a large part of the foreign population is employed in manufacturing establishments; and a small house suitable for an operative and his family would cost \$2,000 and upward. The report continues:

"All native voters who own no real estate must register personally in December and pay their poll tax of \$1 in January, or they are disqualified from voting during that year. This operates to disqualify very many persons and tends largely to corruption a mong this class of voters Restricted suffrage, registry taxes upon poor men alone, statutory closing of the polls at sunset intsead of at 8 o'clock, as formerly, by which the operatives in the mills are prevented from voting, and the compulsory payment of the registry tax ten months prior to the general election in a presidential year, cause great complaint upon the part of the poor men and oreign born citizens in Rhode Island." "The foreign-born citizen may own per-

sonalty, but cannot vote unless he owns real estate, and of course he cannot get upon the registry. If registry taxes for one year are not paid the constitution forbids the vote until the arrears for two years are paid up. Is this the explanation of the fact that of 42,741 voters, shown by the census of 1875, to be in the state and qualified to vote, 26,627 actually did vote in the hotly contested presidential election non-voters is found anywhere, North or South, in that election. The committee believes that the govern-

ment of Rhode Island is nearer further reports committee Rhode Island has a right to have a constitution to suit itself so long as that constitution does not conflict with the constitution of the United States; still Rhode Island has no right to a second representative in the national House of Representatives, and a fourth member in the electoral college, based upon a population of dis-franchised citizens, if such be found to be the fact.

The report says it would be competent for Congress, at this time, to deprive Rhode Island of one of her representatives in Congress if satisfied that the application of the rule laid down in the constitution would reduce the representative basis in that state below the ratio looked to in the ap-

The committee recommends the passage of an act to provide for such an enumeration of persons in the tenth census as will clearly designate the basis of representation required to be made under the Fourteenth amendment, and it reports a bill for that purpose.
