

THE MILTON SUFFERERS. PROMPT LOCAL RELIEF MEASURES.

A Well Attended Meeting and Liberal Response. In response to the call of the mayor upon citizens a meeting was held in the orphans' court room on Saturday evening to devise some means of promptly contributing from Lancaster relief for the sufferers from the terrible and destructive fire which has devastated Milton, Northumberland county, and made three-fourths of its people homeless.

There were some twenty-five or thirty representative business and professional men present, and on Judge Patterson's motion His Honor Mayor John T. MacGonigle presided, and stated the object of the meeting, Mr. Walter Kieffer was made secretary.

The mayor read a list of some subscriptions that had been handed in prior to the convening of the meeting, and quite a number of the persons present announced their subscription in amounts ranging from \$50 down until the whole amount subscribed reached nearly \$500.

The following committees were then appointed to canvass their respective wards on Monday, reporting the amount raised and turning in the money to the mayor by 2:30 p. m. so that a draft for the whole sum subscribed by that time could be at once forwarded to the proper authorities in charge of the relief measures:

In accordance with a resolution passed by the meeting, the pastors of the city churches announced from their pulpits the appointment of this committee and urged their people to make liberal response to its appeals.

Some discussion was had as to the propriety of collecting food and clothing, and it was finally agreed for the present to limit the work to the prompt raising of money, as the more expeditious means of relief.

The mayor was appointed to act as treasurer of the fund, to receive and forward the contributions.

The meeting after some further discussion adjourned.

Work of the Committees. The committees, upon being notified of their appointment, went promptly to work, and during this forenoon have pretty thoroughly canvassed the city.

We publish herewith a list of all the subscriptions received from all sources by the mayor up to 3 p. m. to-day. Those paid in at the meeting of Saturday evening and prior to it are each and all assigned to the respective wards in which the donors reside.

Of course, it has been impossible in the short time already afforded to have seen everybody who is disposed to give to this worthy object, and the committees are still taking subscriptions. All persons disposed to contribute, who have not yet been called upon, may hand their subscriptions to the mayor or to any one of the committee. They will be promptly acknowledged in these columns and will be forwarded at once.

The Pennsylvania railroad company having agreed to forward free of charge all contributions in kind, arrangements will doubtless soon be made to receive and pack a car load of provisions, clothing, &c., in Lancaster.

It is impossible at our hour of going to press to get returns from all the committees and several wards have as yet made no return, but the committees are doing good work, and by to-morrow the complete list of subscribers can be published. The second ward raises \$700 alone, and the sixth nearly \$500. The third has about \$300, and the first, fourth and fifth will run from \$150 to \$250. In all it is estimated that Lancaster city, by to-morrow noon, will have raised the magnificent sum of \$2,300.

Meanwhile subscriptions can be left with the mayor or any member of the committee. Every committee man gives it as his experience that persons give more voluntarily than ever known on a similar occasion.

Going to Europe. Messrs. Michael Zahn, H. Z. Rhoads and his son, Godfried Z. Rhoads, aged 11 years, will leave Lancaster at an early hour to-morrow morning for New York, from which port they will sail on Wednesday in the steamer Labrador, for Havre, France. Mr. Rhoads and his son will remain abroad about three months, visiting France, Italy and Switzerland. Mr. Rhoads's main object being to secure works of art and precious stones. Mr. Zahn will accompany Mr. Rhoads on his tour and will extend his travels into England, Ireland, Scotland and perhaps Germany.

Hand Lacerated. Frank D. Miley, a son of Amos Miley, and employed as a salesman in Steinman & Co.'s hardware store, met with a painful accident this morning. In the store there is a chain rack, from which are suspended, for the inspection of customers, great variety of chains of all sorts and sizes. These chains are hung upon sharp-pointed hooks, seven feet or more from the floor. Mr. Miley attempted to take one of the chains down, and being unable to reach it stepped upon an avil that stood under the chain rack. While he had his hand above the hook, the avil turned under his foot, his wrist was caught on the hook, and the wrist and hand lacerated in a shocking manner, the flesh being torn to the bone for several inches in length. Dr. Henry E. Muhlenberg was called in and sewed up the wound, and the young man, though suffering badly, is doing as well as can be expected.

Attempted Incendiarism. About 10 o'clock last night an attempt was made to burn the stable on Wm. H. Roland's property, corner of Rockland and North streets, and now in the occupancy of Jacob Wittlinger. James Auxer saw the incendiary running away from the stable, and suspecting he had fired it, ran to the stable and put the fire out before it had gained any headway. On going to the stable this morning, Mr. Wittlinger ascertained that a second attempt had been made to burn it—some straw was found therein partly burned, but being damped had failed to fire the building. Mr. Auxer says he can identify the man he saw running from the stable last night.

COLUMBIA NEWS.

Meeting of the Borough Council and Miscellaneous Matters. A stated meeting of council was held on Friday evening last. All members present, excepting Mr. Smith. The finance committee's report, as follows, was read and accepted: Balance on hand, per last report, \$2,778.28 Annual market stall rents, 135.00 Receipts of auditorium, 135.00 Store rents, opera house, 136.00 Show license, per chief burglar, 5.25 Permits of note, 2,973.50 Transient rents, per C. Strawbridge, 52.00 Hershey, collector, 157.00 16.00 187.00 223.75 Total, \$3,600.00

The property committee reported they had rented the vacant opera house store room on Third street to Miss E. Cooper, for auction purposes for several nights; the rate of \$1.50 per night; that they have had a door placed in the orchestra box of the auditorium, ordered two months ago; that they have sanctioned the sub-letting of the store room and restaurant in the opera house leased by Barr and De Arman to Mr. Glover for a drug store, for the unexpired term of their (Barr and De Arman) lease. Mr. Glover desires to draw up a lease for a term of years on the same conditions as those extended, Barr and De Arman.

The committee also reported having purchased a lot of coal for the opera house. On motion report accepted. An ordinance establishing grades on Fourth street and on alley F, presented at last meeting and already published, was adopted.

An ordinance relating to the assemblage of boys and other persons on the pavements, streets or public places, was laid over under the rules.

Mr. William Smurthwaite tendered his resignation as member of council from the third ward, giving as a reason for the same, his intention of removing from the town; the resignation was accepted. Mr. Pfalzer offered the following: Resolved, That the use of the opera house be granted to the Grand Army of the Republic on Sunday evening, May 30, for the purpose of holding decoration services. So ordered. On motion of Mr. Beachman, council decided to attend decoration ceremonies in the opera house, May 30, for the purpose of insuring a prompt collection of borough taxes, and thereby a reduction of the floating debt of the borough, the following conditions shall be made a part of the contract with the tax collector: 1. He shall report to the finance committee at least once a month a correct list of all taxes paid and by whom paid. 2. He shall retain no money from the taxes for his commission, but shall be paid by order drawn at the first meeting of council in each month, upon approval of the finance committee, all commissions that are due, less twenty per cent., which balance shall be paid to him when the duplicate is closed. 3. He shall be allowed no commission on taxes collected by the solicitor upon liens entered by said solicitor.

Mr. Musser offered the following: Resolved, That the tax collector be notified to close the tax duplicate for 1876 on or before July 1, next. Carried.

On motion of Mr. Pfalzer the following was adopted: Resolved, That for the purpose of insuring a prompt collection of borough taxes, and thereby a reduction of the floating debt of the borough, the following conditions shall be made a part of the contract with the tax collector: 1. He shall report to the finance committee at least once a month a correct list of all taxes paid and by whom paid. 2. He shall retain no money from the taxes for his commission, but shall be paid by order drawn at the first meeting of council in each month, upon approval of the finance committee, all commissions that are due, less twenty per cent., which balance shall be paid to him when the duplicate is closed. 3. He shall be allowed no commission on taxes collected by the solicitor upon liens entered by said solicitor.

Mr. Musser moved that an order be drawn in favor of the treasurers of the Columbia, Vigilant and Shawnee fire companies, respectively for \$112.50, the amount of the quarterly appropriation. So ordered.

The following resolution offered by Mr. Kisher was adopted: Resolved, That the Fire Committee be instructed to inquire into the propriety of purchasing a machine for oiling hose to be used by the fire companies.

On motion of Mr. Beachman the finance committee was instructed to advertise for proposals for collecting the borough tax for the year 1880, the same to be opened at the next stated meeting of council. Bills to the amount of \$694.70, including the pay roll of \$152.10. The orders in favor of the three fire companies and for the salaries of the borough solicitor and secretary of council were read and ordered to be paid. The bill of A. M. Rambo was read and referred to the finance committee. Mr. Filbert moved that the property committee be instructed to draw up a lease with Mr. Glover for from one to three years, from Dec. 1st, 1880; passed.

On motion, council adjourned.

The churches and Sunday schools of Columbia, were all well attended yesterday. Rev. J. W. Deshong officiated in the E. E. Lutheran church, on second street, the pastor, Rev. F. W. Staley being absent a visit to York.

The Shawnee fire company No. 3 has decided to purchase a new engine, valued at \$1,200, in company H's armory, on Walnut street. The proceeds will go to the purchase of a lot of ground on Union street, where they propose to build, the present engine house on Front street being entirely too small for their wants. We hope the fair may prove a success.

BY WIRE. The Afternoon's Telegraphic Adverses. Geo. D. Rosenberg, of Pottsville, spike and nail manufacturer, failed to-day, owing to the shrinkage in iron. Liabilities, not over \$50,000.

The grand encampment of I. O. O. F. began an annual session in Reading to-day. The grand lodge convenes to-morrow for a five days' session.

John Gardner & Co.'s Continental brewery, in Philadelphia, 21st and Washington avenue, was damaged by fire this morning to the amount of \$150,000 or \$200,000. Friction caused an explosion in the malt-house.

Michael O'Neill's woolen mill, on North Third street, Philadelphia, was damaged \$3,000 by fire this morning.

Despite fine weather the crops in Russia are endangered by locusts and other insects.

In the New York Harbor, early this morning, the crew of the Victoria fired on five river pirates who tried to board her. One was drowned and the others captured.

Philadelphia's subscription to the Milton relief fund aggregates \$9,000. A citizens meeting to-day appointed committees on distribution and subscriptions.

Under a suspension of the rules the House to-day proceeded to consider the river and harbor bill.

Brigadier Gen. Jacob Zeilin, U. S. marine corps, has been paralyzed and may die.

The Huntzingers, father and son, convict bankers in the Reading jail, made application for discharge this morning as insolvents, their time of sentence having expired. They were sent back to serve the usual three months for the fine and costs.

The "Barrens," a wild tract of scrubby timber in Middletown township, Delaware county, has been set on fire by tramps and has burned fiercely for two days to the great destruction of property.

Incendiarists, by means of an old coat soaked in tar, tried to burn the large jail mill of Cook & Pardee, at Watsonstown, adjoining Milton, yesterday. Children discovered the fire and it was extinguished. Second Assistant Secretary of State Wm. Hunter is convalescing.
