THE MILTON SUFFERERS. PROMPT LOCAL RELIEF MEASURES. A Well Attended Meeting and Liberal

In response to the call of the mayor upon our citizens a meeting was held in the orphans' court room on Saturday evening to devise some means of promptly contributing from Lancaster relief for the sufferers from the terrible and destructive fire which has devastated Milton, Northumberland county, and made three-fourths of its people homeless.

There were some twenty-five or thirty representative business and professional men present, and on Judge Patterson's motion His Honor Mayor John T. Mac-Gonigle presided, and stated the object of the meeting. Mr. Walter Kieffer was made secretary.

The mayor read a list of some subscriptions that had been handed in prior to the convening of the meeting, and quite a number of the persons present announced \$2; cash, \$1; L. Bau, \$1; Jos. Speilman, their subscription in amounts running \$1; J. M. McCulley, \$1. P. Rudy, \$1; from \$50 down until the whole amount subscribed reached nearly \$500.
