The Odd Fellows.

In the meeting of the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. in Reading vesterday the committee on counting the votes polled for grand officers reported the following elected without opposition: R. W. G. M., Alfred R. Potter; R. W. D. G. M., R. F. Knight: R. W. G. Secretary, Jas. B. Nicholson: R. W. G. Treasurer, M. Richards Muckle. For R. W. G. Warden, F. M. Rea led the seven candidates with 1,944 votes. For R. W. G. Sovereign Grand Lodge, S.T.Gwinner had 4,001 to 3,001 for our townsman Dr. John Levergood.

In Pennsylvania last year eleven lodges ceased to exist; seven new charters have been granted; three defunct lodges were revived; \$17,889.61 was paid into the grand treasury; 10,611 brothers were relieved, at a cost of \$264,430.70; 704 widowed families, at a cost of \$14,244,19; \$653.73 were paid for the education of orphans, and \$66,525.12 for burying the dead. The total amount paid for relief was \$345,853.79, an increase of \$2,129.41 cents over the preceding year. The total receipts of the working lodges was \$47,990.42, a decrease of \$5,770.64. Total assets, \$2,367,739.48, a decrase of \$126,513.72. At last report there were 80,118 members. The initiations numbered 4,319; 509 were admitted by eard; 792 reinstated; total membership, 85,738; 862 members died 684 with drew by card; 7,744 were suspended; 79 expelled; total loss, 9,369; total membership, 76,369.

Police Cases.

Last evening Henry Overly was to have had a hearing before Alderman Donnelly, of the Seventh ward, on the charges of malicious mischief and drunken and disorderly conduct. No prosecutor appeared against him and he was therefore discharged.

Before the same alderman two drunk paid their costs and were discharged, and a third was held in bail for a hearing on Friday evening.

Last night a difficulty occurred at the Globe hotel. A man named William West. who was under the influence of liquor, was ejected from the bar-room. He seemed determined to go back and when he attempted to do so Joseph Cremer, the proprietor, struck him on the head with a piece of wood, cutting him severely. The man still made a noise and he was arrested and taken before Alderman Barr, who held him in bail for a hearing on Saturday after-

Sudden Death of a Child. This morning, about 9 o'clock, a threemouths-old child of George Smith, who resides with Isaac Weidler, his father-inlaw, at the corner of Christian and Frederick streets, was found dead in bed by its mother. The child had been in good health, and this morning it was asleep when the mother arose. About 8 o'clock Mrs. Smith again went up stairs, when she thinks that the child was asleep. In an hour afterwards upon going to the room for the second time, she found the child was dead. Coroner Mishler empanelled a Mattern, J W. Jer Rife, Kauffman's, 221/2 East jury, who, after viewing the body adjourned to meet this evening.

Close of Forty Kours' Devotion. The forty hours' devotion at St. Mary's Catholic church closed last evening. Rev. Father Matthew Hunt preached an eloquent sermon. There was a procession, headed by some twenty girls strewing flowers, followed by a number of clergymen, including Fathers Grotemyer, Kaul and Hickey, of this city; Hunt, of Canada; McBride and McKenna, Harrisburg; Igoe, Renovo; O'Neill, Lykens; Reardon, O. M. I., Canada; Brahony, Manayunk, and Lochland, Conshohocken. The number of communicants during this devotion was about 1,000.

Court Proceedings.

In the case of the Hanover Junction and Susquehanna railroad company vs. Ethelbert Watts and William Watts for their stock subscriptions of 200 shares, the court charged the jury this morning on the legal points involved in the case to find for the plaintiffs in the sum of \$13,920. The points involved are substantially those which have been decided previously by this court in similar cases, and the jury accordingly rendered a verdict for plaintiff in this amount.

Court then adjourned until 21 p. m.

Fell From the Cars. The Great Boat Race Likely to Come off— Both Oarsmen in Good Condition and Their Apparatus Intact.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—The weather is fine and all indications point to a race. At 8 o'clock Hanlan was about, said he had had a good night's rest, and would be at the scratch at 4:30. Courtney at the same hour was still asleep, and had left word when last awake to be called at 3 o'clock. At noon the weather is clear with a very light breeze blowing. 
