THE REPUBLICAN NOMINEE.

BLAINE AND GRANT BEATEN.

THE DARK HORSE AGAIN A BUCKEYE. CHICAGO, June 8.—The convention was called to order at 10:30. Garfield and Conkling were cheered as they entered.

Some discussion arose over the right of vote from Alabama to be counted when the delegate casting it was not in his seat. The balloting continued, the notable feature being Sherman's gain by the transfer to him from Massachusetts of some twenty Edmunds men.

[The succession of ballots on the leading candidates will be found in our table, run_ ning from the first yesterday to the last reported at the time of going to press .-EDS.]

Following are the leading features of to-day's balloting as reported by telegraph, including a few scattering votes not ecorded in our table.

Changes and Chances

On the 29th ballot Alabama gave Grant 15, Blaine 1, Sherman 3. Blaine lost 1 in Kentucky, Sherman gained it. Massachusetts gave Sherman 22, of which Edmunds yesterday had 20. Mississippi gave Grant 9. From Minnesota 3 of Windom's men went to Blaine. Blaine gained 2 from Illinois. He lost 2 from New Jersey; they went to Sherman.

On the 30th ballot Wyoming cast 1 vote for General Phil. Sheridan. The convention rose to its feet and cheered Sheridan who was present. He arose and thanked the convention. Minnesota gave Blaine

On the 31st ballot Blaine lost 2 in Indiana. Grant gained 1 in Penna. Conkling received 1 vote.

On the 32d ballot Blaine lost 5 votes from Indiana-gone to Washburne. On the 33d ballot Blaine gained 2 from Georgia and lost 2 in Illinois. On the thirty-fourth ballot Wisconsin

made a break from Washburne to Garfield,

to try the effect of grooming a new dark horse. This brought up Garfield's vote, but reduced Washburne's correspondingly and did not affect the main issue.

When the ballot was announced, showing Garfield's increase, he challenged its

Garfield with 11 votes. On the 36th ballot, when Illinois was reached. Garfield got 4 votes; Indiana gave him 29; Iowa cast 22 for him and the excitement became intense. Amid loud cheers for Garfield, Kansas gave him

As this ballot went on it became apparent that Garfield would receive all of Blaine's strength and the excitement became intense over the prospect of his nomination. Louisiana cast 8 for him, Maine 14; Nevada and New Hampshire went solid for him; Ohio gave him 43, Pennsylvania 21, New York 20; Michigan, Massachusetts and New Jersey followed. By this time it seemed certain that he

would be nominated. When Tennessee voted 7 for him the poll was questioned and a roll call ordered. Before the end of the ballot was reached and when Vermont voted for him Garfield was nominated. The convention went wild with excitement, and the band could not be heard for the cheers.

Garfield, of Mentor, was oorn in Orange, Cuyahoga county, Ohio, November 19, 1831, graduated at Wiliams college, Massachusetts, in 1856; was president of a literary institution for several years; studied and practised law; was a member of the State Senate of Ohio in 1859-'60; entered the Union army in 1861 as colonel of the Forty-second Ohio Volunteers; was promoted to the rank of brigadier general January 10, 1862; was appointed chief of staff of the Army of the Cumberland, and was promoted to the rank of major general September 20, 1863; was elected to the Thirty-eighth, Thirtyninth, Fortieth, Forty-first, Forty-second, Forty-third, Forty-fourth and Forty-fifth Congresses, and was re-elected to the Forty-sixth Congress as a Republican, receiving 17,166 votes against 7,553 votes for Hubbard, Democrat, and 3,148 votes for Tuttle, National. He was elected United States senator to succeed Thurman by the Ohio Legislature last winter, and would have taken his seat at the opening of the Forty-seventh Congress in 1881.
