OVERFLOW OF THE RESERVOIR.

The Result of Malicious Mischief.

This morning about 2 o'clock George Mowery, who lives on East Orange street, near the reservoirs, discovered that the west reservoir was full and overflowing. He at once notified Constable Cramer, who in turn notified Superintendent Kitch, and that officer sent a fleet messenger to the water works to have the pumps stopped.

The overflow was over the north wall of the basin. It did no damage to the inside wall nor to the footway on top of the embankment, but several cartloads of sod and earth are washed away from the Orange street slope.

The accident was caused by the breaking of the wires of the electric bell connecting the reservoir with the water works on the Conestoga. This bell is in the en- dislocated her arm. It was first believed gine room of the water works and is so that it was merely a sprain, but as it did connected that whenever the reservoir is not seem to improve, Dr. Boyd was called as full as it is safe to have it, it sounds in yesterday and he attended the wounded an alarm and continues to ring until limb. the water has fallen sufficiently to break the electric current. As long as the bell does not ring, the engineer continues to work the pumps. When it rings he stops one or more of the pumps as may be necessary to reduce the height of the water, always keeping the water at or a little below the ringing point.

An examination of the bell and its connections leaves no doubt that they were maliciously tampered with for the purpose probably of injuring the resorvoirs and bringing discredit on the officers in charge of the water works. On several previous occasions the electric bell has been so much injured that it would not work. Only last Sunday the large ice-house on the reservoir grounds was burned down. On Monday the privy was set on fire and burned, together with several panels of fence. On several occasions the stakes driven in the bottom of the east resorvoir (now undergoing repairs) as a guide to the workmen in levelling the bottom, have been pulled out or driven in too deeply, thus rendering them useless, while barrows and other tools have been injured or destroyed, and various other acts of vandalism have been perpetrated in and about the reservoir. One of the prison watchmen says that while on duty last night he saw men either wading or swimming in the reservoir not far from the electric bell. These several acts prove that some one or more persons are engaged in them and that they are actuated by malice or revenge which they hold against the present officials. It is a question whether both economy and the safety of the reservoirs do not demand the employment of a night watchman to guard them.

As long ago as last April Mayor Mac-Gonigle proposed that a waste pipe be laid, leading from near the surface of the east basin to the Groffstown road. so as to carry off the surplus water in case the resevoir should from any case become too full; and to have the east and west resevoirs connected by a pipe near the top of the wall which separates them. This improvement was sanctioned by councils, and will be added as soon as the repairs now being made shall be finished.

LIABILITY OF THE COUNTY FOR COSTS

Fees of the Mayor, Aldermen, Justices o the Peace, Policemen and Constables in Prosecutions for Trespassing Upon Railroad Trains, etc.

The following opinion of County Solicitor Hugh R. Fulton, esq., given to the commissioners on Thursday last, will in-augurate considerable of a change in the matter of the payment of costs by the county to magistrates, constables and the city police :

To the Commissioners of Laneaster County. GENTLEMEN : In reference to the disputed fees, I submit the following :

I. Trespassing Upon Railway Trains. By a recent decision of the supreme ourt of Pennsylvania, published in the Lancaster Bar, June 26, 1880. the county is not liable for and cannot hereafter pay either magistrates or constables costs in prosecutions for trespassing upon railway WHITE GOODS DEPARTMENT!





This cycle is a period of twentyeight years, during which the days of the month of each year return to the same days of the week as in a corresponding year of a preceding cycle, and the same connection is observed between the changes of the day of the week in passing from one year to the next. true that the same day is month falls on the the of same day of the week four times during this cycle, but the same regular session is not preserved in the intervening years. Hence the entire period of twentyeight years is required to regulate the calendar. A new cycle commences in 1896. and the Fourth of July falls on Sunday in 1897, 1903, 1908 and 1814.

II. County Not Liable Unless Defendant Sentenced to Hard Labor. By the same decision and that of Judge Harding published in the Legal Intelligencer, September 13, 1876, the county is not liable for the costs of any conviction before a justice of the peace, unless it is expressly required by statute or the defendant is sentenced to hard labor and commit-

The act of 1869, P. L. 454, sec. 7, amending the charter of the city of Lancaster, limits the mayor of the city and all other officers receiving a salary from the city to half fees in prosecutions for drunkenness and disorderly conduct and vagrancy, when

such persons are committed, and provides that they shall receive no fees for cases IV. The Fees.

The full fee fixed by the act of 1868, P. L. 876, for the mayor and aldermen of 105 Lancaster city for all services in disorderly conduct and disturbance of the peace cases is fifty cents, of which the mayor charges 105 one-half. The full fee for the policemen and constables of Lancaster city in such cases, by

the same act, is thirty cents, of which the city police can only charge one-half. V. Fees in Vagrancy Cases.

For the mayor and aldermen of Lancaster city, and all justices of the peace in the county, the fee fixed by the act of 1879 P. L. p. 64, for all services in vagrancy cases is twenty-five cents, of which the mayor charges one half, and for constables for all services twenty-five cents and mileage, of which the city police charges one half and mileage.

VI. Fees in Cases of Drunkenness.

For the simple offense of drunkenness, when the defendant is ordered to pay a fine and costs, the county is not liable for those costs in case the defendant does not pay If, however the defendant is sentenced

and committed to hard labor under the act of 1794, Purdon's Digest p. 1172, sec. 4, the county is liable for the alderman's, justice's and constable's full fees according police being restricted by the act of 1869 to half fees.

VII. Receiving and Duplicating Unfound-ed Complaints.

" A justice of the peace is not bound to issue a warrant whenever it is applied for ; he is to use a legal discretion, and deter-mine on mature deliberation of all the circumstances whether a warrant should ssue, and if upon hearing the charge opened, he thinks it not to be an offense within the law, he ought not to proceed upon it; which would be to no purpose but mercly to put persons to unnecessary trouble and charge."-1 Yeates, 74.

Under the above decision it is very evident that where complaints are received or duplicated without just cause merely for the purpose of docketing fees to be drawn from the county on their dismissal, the county is not liable for the costs. Respectfully, HUGH R. FULTON,




