The fly, the weevil, rust, mildew, &c., played havoc with the crop, so that there was no certainty in it. Against the ravages of Hessian fly alone there seemed to be no protection We have seen fields of from twenty to thirty acres of wheat so utterly de-

stroyed as not to pay for the cutting. But this has passed. There are at this time few crops that suffer much less from insect pests than wheat. We have seen scores of fields this season within an area of ten miles around Germantown which HOP could not be surpassed anywhere on the face of the earth. If they did not yield forty bushel to the acre, then this quantity is too great to grow upon an acre. This success has infused more confidence in the general farmer, and he now grows as much wheat as the extent of his land, in the system of mixed husbandry which is wisely followed, will warrant. This increase in the several states alluded to is very nearly if not entirely sufficient to meet our home wants, and has a tendency to more or less fix prices which cannot at all times be subjected to the fluctuations of the West.

Beside the increase of the crop here, the New England states are also awakening to the necessity and advantages of appropriating an increased breadth of land to wh at as we I as to corn, and thus make themselves more independent of the western productions, for which they find they have to pay a premium over what they can grow for themselves at their own

The Turnip Crop.

There is no crop that the farmer puts in the ground that pays him better than the turnip. We are aware that with some persons it is looked upon as of little account; but it has never received the consideration to which it is really entitled; and those who turn-up their noses at it are not genuine farmers. It is a crop moreover that is put in at a time when the harrying work of the season is over; when it occupies ground that has already been used for something else. The cultivation aleo, say of from one to two acres of tornips, involves comparatively little labor. The crop, too, is harvested in November, when there is almost no other labor on the
