Tobacco.

Last Week's New York Market. U. S. Tobacco Journal.

With the exception of sales of about 800 cases of '79 Ohio for export at 7 1/2 cents nothing noteworthy occurred. The market has taken on a condition of almost utter stagnation. There is not the least evincement of any speculative movement. The situation is but natural, and was predicted by the U. S. Tobacco Journal many months ago. The dead-lock exists and will last till some of the shareholders of the packers of the '79 Pennsylvania crop sell their packings the first chance they get, regardless of the investment figures.

This will take place soon. Most of the packers of that crop who operate in this market begin to realize the correctness of the U. S. Tobacco Journal's predictions, but they will not acknowledge it publicly, nor can they as long as they hold this stock. They even continue to pronounce the predictions and advice of this paper false, foolish and unwarranted; but this deception is practiced to make the neighborly holder "stiff" to encourage him to ask a good profit; to induce him to refuse an offer and thus drive him into the arms of the deceiver, who is too glad to unload at even a loss. We are positive that after such sales the sellers openly brag of the profit they have made on their sales. They thereby hope to retain their reputation of being first-class packers, honest, foolish and unwarranted predictions of the U. S. Tobacco Journal. There was a report that Messrs. Bunn & Dornizer had offered their packing of '79 Pennsylvania at 14 cents. The report is denied in toto as well as the one that Mr. C. H. Spitzer had sold to a Water street firm 400 cases of the same class of goods at 15 cents.

Sampling of all kinds of '79 tobacco continues, and the assorting of lots forms almost the only occupation of packers. The '79 Connecticut is as yet warm in the cases, and, of course, appears tender, but the export sales are already referred to above. Exporters show some activity in inspecting samples of new tobacco and in making offers for suitable parcels. They are unanimous in the opinion that had the packers of '79 Pennsylvania heeded the advice of the U. S. Tobacco Journal and paid lower figures for the crop they could have disposed of all the surplus for export at a handsome profit. As it is, they cannot even come up to the expectations of holders of even the poorest of the crop. The total sales, including those for export, reached about 1200 cases, of which 200 were '79 Pennsylvania running, at 16 cents, re-weight, and 180 cases '70 Ohio, at 10 cents, re-weight.

Havana remains active and sales are easy. Holders of '79 are jubilant over the continued poor reports regarding the '80 crop and expect good profits on the investments, an expectation which not alone is justified by circumstances, but which will undoubtedly be realized.
