A Spirited Story. M. W. H. in N. Y. Sun Book Review.

In the poem which, to our thinking, is the most spirited of all these sketches of Browning's, an old comrade of Clive's tells a story which he heard from the lips of the victor of Plassy. Dining once with his old comrade in London, the narrator had asked him which feat out of all his famous doings stood foremost in his own calm estimation, as evincing what Clive himself called courage. To such a query Lord Plassy, like most brave men, could or would give no answer, but he would tell his guest, he said, when he felt most fear, and he went on to recount an inci dent whose mere remembrance, he insisted still froze his blood. It was in his early days of poverty and drudgery, when he was an humble clerk in the Indian civil service, and when, as a great honor, he was permitted to lose his meagre earnings at a game of cards in company with his social superiors. It befell one night, when he was playing with some regimental offi-cers, that one of them, a captain, made a certain movement with his hand, whose significance was at once detected by the civilian. Clive rose and confronted his antagonist with the words:

"Such the new manœuvre, Captain? I'm noylee; knowledge grows. What, you force a card, you cheat, sir?" Of course such an accusation on the part of a wretched clerk was bitterly resented

by all the military gentlemen and the out-raged Captain bade Clive down upon his knees and whine for pardon, or have his life snuffed out. To which Clive rejoined, simply, "Well, you cheated."

"Then outbroke a howl from all the friends around.

To his feet sprang each in fury, fists were clenched and teeth were ground.

End it! no time like the present! Captain, yours were our disgrace!

No delay, begin and finish! Stand back, leave the pair a space ! Let civilians be instructed ; henceforth simply ply the pen, Fly the sword! This clerk's no swo Sult him with a plstol then!

Even odds! A dozen paces 'twixt the most and least expert

Make a dwarf a giant's equal; may, the dwarf if he's alert,

Likelier hits the broader target!"

They stood up accordingly, but, when the word was given. Clive's forefinger in-advertently pressed the trigger and discharged his weapon before he could take aim. Of course it was now the Captain's

Just an arm's length. 'Now, my clerkling,' chuckled Cocky with a grin

As for me, my homely breeding bids you—fire and go to hell!"

Twice the muzzle touched my forehead. Heav: barrel, flurried wrist, Either spoils a steady lifting. Thrice, then, 'Laugh at hell who list, I can't! God's no fable either. Did this boy's eye wink once? No! There's no standing him and hell and God all three against me—so.

And down he threw the pistol, out rushed." Such was Clive's account (unfinished, as

we shall see) of a scene whose memory, he assured his friend, still made "gooseflesh His friend rejoins, with a laugh, that everything is relative, and he can see nothing fearful in the story when compared with other incidents in Clive's life. In a common case, no doubt, where a bully caught at cheating thrusts a pistol in your face, it would be a trial to the nerves, but the victor of Arcot, Plassy, and a score of fields had come, in his time, to even closer quarters. At this Clive bounds up in an outburst of wrathful scorn, indignant that his friend should miss the true cause of his

more appalling appears the crisis which Browning has here pictured. It is plain that had the blackleg had the wit to discern his advantage, not only would suicide have been Clive's sole resource, but even suicide could not have cleared his blasted reputation. It was the thought of the foul blot-unmerited, yet ineffacablewhich might have frested on his name, which, recalled after the lapse of years still had power the shake the pulse and bead the brow of the conqueror of Plassy.
