The Outlook for 1880—The New York Mar-ket—The Local Trade. A drive of some forty miles through the county recently presented nothing so striking in agricultural operations as the general cultivation of tobacco, the activity of the growers in cutting and housing it, and the many improvements which they are making in facilities for storing it. Throughout the northeastern part of the county where some depreciation had been reported we found the crop very good. The growth of the tobacco has not been as rapid and the quality will not likely be as fine as last year, but it will average excellently, the acreage is quite as large, if not greater, the weight will exceed that of 1880, and when the profits of the planting are counted they will be as great. The crop now being housed has very luckily escaped hail or any other general disaster, and is now pretty well out of danger More than half of it is housed. Few fields have not as yet been touched with the knife, many are entirely cleared, and in nearly all the foremost crops are pretty well in. Another week of good weather will see the tobacco mostly on the poles. It is noticeable how many tobacco shedsmany with basements-have been built during the past year, and all indications point to the growing appreciation of the farmer that it is in the successful curing of

The New York Market. The Tobacco Journal for the past week continues to bear the market, represents it as demoralized, predicts an immense '80 crop and a lowering of prices from 25 to 50 per cent. It decleres that '79 tobacco is a drug and export at a stand-still. The Journal has of late shown such a disposition to sacrifice the truth to its own pride of opinion and reckless desire to keep down prices and justify its ever-failing predic-tions, that it is with little confidence that we quote even its reported sales of last

The Local Market. Topping, cutting and housing the crop of 1880 is still the order of the day among farmers. It is thought that more than half the crop, in weight, has been cut off, but many hundred acres, planted late, are still untopped—some of it hardly worth

Samplers are still active with the crop up a few hundred cases during the past week at private rates.

Spingarn & Co. sold their entire stock to Lichtenstein Bros. & Co; Fox, Dills & Co sold all their 1879 Pennsylvania (about 500 cases) to several parties at good figures; Henry Myer, of Cincinnati, visited New York and bought large quantity of fine 1878 Pennsylvania E. Rosenwald & Bro. sold 200 cases Housatonic and several hundred cases of Penn sylvania and Connecticut leaf.
