

With a Fighting Chance for Two More. PORTLAND, Mc., Sept. 14.- The Temperance vote in the state is trilling. Two hundred and seven towns give Davis 43, 477, Plaisted 41,837, scattering 220: total 85,534. The same towns last year gave Davis 41,394, Smith 26,800. Garcelon 12,803; scattering, 161; total 81,248. Davis's majority is 1,420, again a 1,540 in the same towns last year. The towns to hear from gave Davis 27,719, Smith and Garcelon 30,121, being a Fusion majority of 2,402. The aggregate vote received has increased about 5 per cent., which indicates an aggregate of 146,500. As each vote has increased about the same, the Republicans should have 72,500, the Fusionists 73,500, Prohibition and seattering 500. A Fusion plurality of 1,000
