Epigrams. There is an inscription on a gravestone in New Jersey, which is worthy of the savage dean of St. Patrick's:

"Reader, pass on—don't waste your time, On his biography as a former saint. For what I am, this crumbling clay insures, And what I was is no affair of yours."

Some disappointed lover doubtless indited the following poor disillusioned man, to a disdainful beauty:

"Your breast is white as mountain snows, Your cheek is like a blushing rose, Your eyes are black as ripened plums, Like diamonds do they glitter— I do not flatter like a fool— The diamond is a cutting loss, The rose is thorny, snow is cool, And roses are very bitter!"

The ensuing epitaph is said to exist in Rensselaer church yard:

"This stone was raised by Sarah's lord, Not Sarah's virtues to record; They're too well-known by all the town, But it was raised to keep her down."

But here is another on the other side of the question, wherein the husband receives the condemnation often meted out to the wife:

"Here lies the body of Mary Ford— We hope her soul is with the Lord; But for her father she changed this life, Better to be than John Ford's wife."

The would-be beauty and the would-be "blue" are "hit off" in the following:

"The golden hair Camilla wears Is hers—who would have thought it? She swears 'tis hers, and true she swears, For I know where she bought it!"

On a poetess who had red hair:

"Unfortunate woman—how sad your lot— Your ringlets are red and your poems are not." Samuel Bishop was called the "Martial of England," and was the author of the "Maiden's Choice":

"A fool and knave with different views, For Julia's hand apply, The knave, to lose his fortune, sues, The fool to please his eye— Ask you how Julia will behave? It depends on't how you'll behave, If she's a fool, she'll wed the knave, If she's a knave, the fool."

The professions come for their share of railing—even the clergy do not escape for example:

Cries Sylvia to a reverend dean, "What reason can be given, Since marriage is a holy thing, that there is none in heaven?"

"There are no women there," he said. She quick returns to the poet, "Women there are; but I'm afraid they cannot find a priest."

This pungent satire emanated from Robert Dodsley, who began life as a footman and ended it as a successful bookseller and author. The unknown writer of the following, doubtless, thus revenged himself on a tedious sermonizer:

"Jehovah, ruler of the earth and skies, Of those who choose the foolish to be wise, If so the audience will agree) the Lord has made no blunder in selecting Ford."

The lawyers are again in their turn. Witness the following. Like the preceding possibly composed by a sufferer.

Two lawyers, when a knotty case was o'er, Shook hands and were as friendly as before. "Fondly," said a client, "I would fain know how You can be friends who were such foes just now?"

"Thou fool!" said one, "we lawyers, though so keen, Like shears ne'er cut ourselves, but what's between?"

The poets are more severe on each other than on anyone else, thus confirming the vulgar saying that we must seek our Ishmael to roast an Irishman—e. g., Colley Cibber, whom Pope envisioned as king of the Dunces, was poet laureate, and his brethren of the pen evicted him accordingly, one of them venting his spleen by the following lines:

"In merry old England it once was a rule, The king had his fool, and also his fool, But now we're so frugal, I'd have you to know That Cibber can serve both for fool and for poet."

Here is another equally graceful and polite:

"Sir, I admit your general rule, That every poet is a fool, But you yourself will serve to show it, That every fool is not a poet."

Martial wrote many good epigrams (and many bad ones, say his readers) and does not fail to touch upon the tendency of authors to sneer at each other. The two following are different translations of the same, ad auctum. The first is by Sir John Harrington, the godson of the great Elizabeth, and himself a fertile writer of one distich that the world will not willingly let die.

"Treacherous death never prosper—what's the reason? For it is proper, none dare call it treason."

"A brother scribbler calls my verses wrong, In point of art; small merit can he see, Well, since my readers like my simple song, That I am sure, he cannot do for me."

The man who gives a public dinner looks To please his guests, not other people's cooks.

"But the readers and the hearers like my books; But yet some writers cannot digest; But what care I for when I make a feast? I would my guests should make it, not the cooks."

Addison translated Martial's celebrated quatrain:

"In all my limbers, whether grave or mellow, That I will touch a touchy, teasing, teasing, I'll not touch with wit and mirth and spleen about thee, There is no living with thee or without thee."

So the Latin poet has been fortunate in his English interpreter.
