POLITICAL AND OTHERWISE.
COUNTY NOTES AND NEWS.
THINGS DOWN IN BART.

Our Regular Correspondence.

On Thursday, the 16th inst., Mrs. Leah Gilliland, one of the oldest residents of Bart township, was treated to a grand surprise by friends and relatives. Mrs. G. had been visiting some of her children, grand-children, and great-grand-children, and on her return home she found her house filled with guests, her tables laden with all manner of delicacies, and a beautiful wreath—prepared in the form of a crown by Miss Josie Martin, a grand-niece—ready to be placed upon her brow as a token of respect, and to designate her as the honored guest of the occasion. The surprise was one of the real ones, and the old lady was well pleased with the result. The M.E. extra meetings are in progress in Georgetown, and our usually quiet village is in consequence more noisy of nights. Quite a number of young men and "girls" from the neighborhood are regular attenders at these meetings; whether for good or evil, or from indolent curiosity, their lives in future will indicate.

The saddler shop of J. R. Chamberlin is decorated with a fine picture of the coming man, W. S. Hancock, and the saddler often stops from his work to look at it and reflect on the past history of the man and the future he will bring to our country.

Mr. S. F. Jones thinks from the manner of his dog, Top, that an effort is still being made to enter his store. For some two or three nights past, Top has been in a restless state and keeps the family awake by his incessant barking. Suspicious characters have been seen and marked upon the citizens of the vicinity, and the "squire and Pete are on the 'quiere'."

Mr. J. H. Leech has advertised his farm for sale and intends going to Philadelphia if he succeeds in making a sale. Mr. Leech has been for five years a school director in the township, and will be missed in the capacity when leaves the township.

Bart Politics.
Bart is one of the most conservative townships in the county; men of all party affiliations are elected to fill the township offices. While the township has been for several years in full control of the Republican party by a majority ranging from 15 to 35, yet in the coming November election no party is bold enough to claim a majority for either of the presidential candidates. No doubt the county ticket will have a Republican majority, but bets are not flying around on the national ticket.

The Garfield pole that was to tower so majestically at the nickel mines after the Maine election was heard from, has failed as yet to make its appearance. We presume the reason was the same that caused two calls to fail to organize a Garfield club in Bart.

SALISBURY NEWS.
Our tobacco crop is nearly all housed and much better than last year's crop. The corn crop is also very fine and almost all in shock.

The potato crop is not as large as last year but is a fair average. We find that the grub worm has injured the potatoes considerably by boring into them. Never before saw them as plenty at this season of the year.

GAP NEWS.
Collected and Reported by a Fourteen-Year-Old Democrat.

Our farmers are busy putting their tobacco away and cutting their corn. The corn crop promises to be a very good one this year.

On Tuesday, August 31st, the Democratic boys of Gap and vicinity, who believe strongly in the Democratic doctrine, erected a beautiful pole in honor of our next president and vice president, Hancock and English. The pole is as straight as an arrow and has a beautiful taper. It stands about 80 feet out of the ground, has a cross on top, a Hancock and English streamer and the dear old flag of our country, which General Hancock supported so bravely when our country was in danger. About half way up the pole is a finely painted board with the name of "Hancock" in large letters. The pole is erected in the center of the township, and the Republican men of Salisbury and other surrounding townships have erected a pole in honor of the "DeGolyer contractor, Credit Mobilier and Pacific railroad candidate, James A. Garfield," which is a few feet higher than the "boy's" pole. But it is not the highest pole that elects the president, but the highest and largest vote; and I am afraid that our Republican friends will have to let their "pole" drop quietly to the ground on the morning of November 3, 1880, when the sad news comes that Garfield is beaten by a majority of nearly one-half a million votes.

On Saturday, September 18th, the "young" Democrats of the Gap, ranging from four to six years of age, erected a Hancock and English pole about fifty-two feet out of the ground. A clever sized flag floats from it. They have also a Hancock and English board nailed on the pole.

On Saturday morning, August 18th, the young Republicans who attended the running of the flag up the Garfield pole must have been asleep when he put the flag on the pole upside down, and ran it up the pole and never noticed his mistake until about an hour afterwards, when a kind Democrat informed him that he had his flag upside down. This is an example of the Republican government if Garfield is elected. They will have an upside down government and the Democrats will have to straighten it out and turn it.

DE GOLYER POLE AT MT. JOY.
Bloody Shirt Speeches by Bold Orators.

The Junior De Golyer club of Mt. Joy was to have raised a pole on Saturday night, but it was found to require all the strength of the seniors to get up the stick which, like the party, is in three pieces. After one of the best workers—who lost a government office for cause not related in his speech, and hopes to get it back under Garfield—had spoken five minutes there was a "granny" speech of the most virulent bloody-shirt stripe. The "cullud brudder" Archie was called out, and though three cheers were given for him by a dusky sister who was refused by his white brethren, he launched out when the disgusted white brethren sloped for the nearest saloons and Archie quite broke down. Capt. Bailey, of color, followed him and told a harrowing tale of slavery days without reference to domestic work prevailing in the North. The whites gradually quit the meeting, and the mokes and the few remaining boys adjourned it with feeble cheers.

The Circus at Lititz.
The Republicans expected to have a great time at Lititz on Saturday evening. They announced a pole-raising, wigwag dedication, mass meeting and torchlight procession, and boasted that they would have eight hundred men in line. The fact is they had just eighty-two persons in the procession, about fifty of whom were voters. The expected delegations from Lancaster, Manheim and other points did not put in an appearance. The wigwag was erected by a few dunces, and the fact that it failed to produce the least enthusiasm and Andy Kauffman's participation only reminded the people how shamefully he had betrayed his constituents at Chicago.

The Worst Yet.
The Republicans on Saturday raised a small pole on the banks of Geyer's ore mines in Providence township. There was a small crowd present and the speeches, which were made by "Cock," Gatchell and County Auditor James Collins, were about the worst yet made during the campaign.

Another Letter from Maine.
The following extracts from a letter received in this city from Auburn, Me., dated the 17th inst., show in what light the people of the "Pine Tree State" view the recent state election, and what they expect to be the result in the presidential struggle: "However the state election may come out after the hot campaign just closed, had we known on Tuesday last that we had certainly elected two members of Congress and come within two or three hundred votes of electing two more, and cut Davis's majority down to 500, we would have fired our guns, rung our bells, and the Republicans would have gone into their hovels. But now they think that they are not beaten quite so bad as they thought they had been and are thus elated."

If Indiana and Ohio give a fair show for the Democrats you may confidently expect a majority for Hancock in this state. The Republicans in other states are saying that the Fusion will not hold in November. They either lie or do not understand the situation. The state committee of the Democrats and Greenbackers agreed in the summer, before the state canvass, on an electoral ticket—four Greenbackers and three Democrats. Some very ultra Greenbackers called a state convention, to come off in a day or two, to nominate a straight-out Weaver ticket. Delegates have been elected by the Greenbackers to it, but so far as heard from they are for the Fusion electoral ticket nominated by the state committee. Solon Chase was here yesterday; he has been talking of a new ticket, but he has now backed down, and goes for the Fusion ticket agreed upon. So far as I know all the Greenbackers are for Hancock excepting Solon Chase. Look out for a Hancock victory in Maine."

THE "SOLDIER" VOTE.
How It was Shamefully Manipulated.

Eds. INTELLIGENCER: A few days since I noticed a table in the Examiner (taken from some paper) which purported to show how the soldiers voted when in the army, and which was probably correct as far as it went. But if all returns were used as that of our regiment it is a wonder that there were any Democratic votes returned at all. In 1864, at the presidential election I was inspector in the 188th Penna. Vols., and in the actual vote, in a poll of about 700 votes, there were exactly 25 votes for Lincoln, all the balance were for McClellan. But this vote was never returned to the state. It was taken by Major Richard, who was then in command of the regiment, and by him, in the presence of the guards, it was thrown into the fire and burned. This I can prove by the men of the regiment, both Republicans and Democrats.

TEMPERANCE COUNTY CONVENTION.
A Full Ticket in the Field.

The Temperance county convention met in Temperance hall, this city, on Monday, Dr. Josiah Martin in the chair, and P. S. Goodman acting as secretary. Dr. Martin and James Black, esp., made speeches against both of the main political parties and favoring independent action by the prohibitionists. Mr. Keeney, of Salisbury, was for Temperance men in local offices, but did not think it necessary to endorse Neal Dow for president. Geo. Knox was for going the whole way. Finally the following committee was appointed to report a counter ticket: James Black, of Lancaster; Mr. King, of Little Britain; Rev. J. H. Wheeler, of Columbia; Rev. E. S. Heany, Strasburg; Geo. Knox, Bart; R. B. Schlott, Reamstown; George Smith, Drumore.

A series of resolutions were passed justifying independent political action on the ground that the local candidates of the other parties refused to say whether they would or would not support local option.

Finally the committee reported the following ticket which was settled:

Prison Inspectors—George Smith, Drumore; Sadsbury, George Smith, Drumore.
Poor Directors—William Wilson, Little Britain; Silas Weller, city.
County Surveyor—Wilmer P. Bolton, Drumore.
