Ocid F. Johnson, Esq:

subjoined letter from General St. Clair A. Mulholland: PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 14, 1380: My Dear Sir—Yours of the 16th inclosing extract of the speech delivered by Hon. F. Jordan received. Mr. Jordan's statement in regard to Gen. Hancock's participation in the bat-tle of Gettysburg is absolutely false. General Hancock was wounded on the afternoon of July 3d at the close of Pickett's charge on the line of the Second corps, and remained on the field directing the fight remained on the field directing the fight until the battle was over and the victory won. He was wounded by a musket ball, which passed through the pommel of his saddle, entered his groin, carrying with it a nail from the saddle. He fell amongst his men in the very midst of the fight. I saw him a few minutes before he was wounded. The statement of Mr. Jordan is a falsehood of such magnitude as to become ridiculous. We might as well doubt the fact of the battle might as well doubt the fact of the battle of Gettysburg ever having been fought, as that General Hancock repulsed the charge of Longstreet's troops. I am amazed that Mr. Jordan would be guilty of making the statement attributed to him in your letter.
