BANKERS DIFFER.

An Episode in Politics Between Ohio Business Men.

Mr. D. J. Fallis, president of the Mer chants' national bank of Cincinnati having stated in an interview with a Commercial reporter, that if Hancock should be elected president, government bonds would not be worth 90 cents on the dollar. Mr. Theodore Cook a prominent banker and manufacturer, chairman of the local Democratic executive committee, sent Mr. Fallis a letter in which he says: " Now, Mr. Fallis, this is a pretty heavy stump speech to inject into a brief interview on a purely business matter. If you are right in what you say the condition in public affairs is critical and dangerous. If you are wrong you are simply an alarmist, and much mischief may come from your statement. Hancock, I think, will be elected, and in view of that supposed fact I make you this offer, viz: So soon as it is ascertained that Hancock is elected president I will buy the \$1,000,000 worth of government 4 per cent. bonds held by your bank at par. I will give such security as will be satisfactory to your board of directors to take and pay for the Londs on delivery, and you shall give me satisfactory security that you will deliver them. That is 10 per cent. more than you say they will be worth: and I will give you and your bank a nice, clear profit of \$10,000 on a single transaction. This proposal is seriously made, and I await your acceptance of it.' A reporter called on Mr. Fallis to learn whether or not he intended accepting Mr. Cook's proposition. He was evidently very much annoyed, and answered that what he had said to the Commercial reporter was merely his individual opinion and that he had no authority to act for the

bank in the matter.

A letter has reached Washington from Senator Jones, of Nevada, which; comes very near being what is now the popular line of letter writing. Senator Jones has always been a staunch Republican, or at least always was until quite recently, so what he writes is especially significant as revealing the real drift of political feeling among the class of Republicans to he belongs. His assciations judged from the elegant testimonal of their regard bestowed upon him last winter at Deimonico's by the most prominent Republicans in the country. The present letter is written to a very intimate friend. In it Senator Jones say bluntly and without reserve that he is tired of the Republican party and has virtually left it. Had General Grant been nominated at Chicago he would have exerted himself to secure his election, but with Garfield's nomination he was disgusted from the start, and what has transpired since has determined him to disconnect himself from any participation in the party's conduct. He will go further than this in Nevada state politics by opposing the re-election to the Senate of Sharon and supporting Colonel Fair, a Democrat. Just now Senator Jones adds: "If asked his politics he would declare himself more of a Greenbacker than anything else, but he articipates so much bitterness for Republicans. licans for his change of views that he shall not be surprised, before the end of the campaign, to find himself declaring himself a Democrat."
