A Lamp Blown Out. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 19.—A fire broke out at half past one o'clock this morning in the lamp black factory of Biehr & Wolf on Frankford creek, near Ash street, Bridgeburg. The building and contents were entirely destroyed. Loss \$10,000.
