The Starry Heavens. Third Regular meeting of Star Club.

A full meeting of the Star club was held at the rooms of the Christian association last evening. In addition to the numerical star list, which was increased to fortysix, Mr. Frank Greist read a very interesting paper on the planets, and the history of the advance in astronomical knowl edge in regard to them from the crude eories of olden times to the certain knowledge of the present. The star list was continued as follows by Mr. J. P. Mc-Caskey:

The constellation familiarly known as "Job's Coffin," but marked on the charts as the Dolphin, is a faint group lying between the Eagle and the Great Square of Pegasus. Altair of the Eagle, it will be remembered, is at the southern angle of the triangle which includes the Northern Cross. The star in the head of the Dolphin, nearest Gienah in the Northern Cross, is Svalozin; while Rotanew is nearest Altair. We turn now to the northwest and look at one or more of the constellations in this quarter. A line drawn from Deneb, in the head of the Northern Cross to the North Star will determine the position of the constellation Cepheus, and fix its principal stars. The two stars Alderamin and Alphirk lie a little off this line, the former being nearer Deneb, and the latter about eight degrees distant, towards the North Star. The third star named in this constellation is Errai, which may be determined by a triangle, nearly isosceles having Alphirk and the North Star at the extremities of its bases and Errai at its vertex towards the W formed by the

principal stars in Cassiopœia's Chair. To fix the head of the Dragon, an irregular quadrilateral, we draw a line from Vega to the North Star, and the first point in the position of our group is determined, the head being on the side of our line toward the Great Dipper, and not far from Vega. The star nearest Vega is Etanin, the next, in a straight line toward the first in the handle of the Great Dipper, is Rastaban, the next, a faint star in the same direction is El Rakis. The Dragon may now be traced by a line of stars curving upward and backward, toward Alderamin and Alphirk. It then returns pass ing between the two Dippers and almost enclosing the Little Dipper. As it passes around the bowl of the Little Dipper, half way between this and the second star in the handle of the Great Dipper we have Thuban, the old North Star of 4,000 years

The Great Dipper—also known as "The Plough" and "Charles's Wain"—in the constellation of the Great Bear, is a widely known group of stars in the circumpolar region of the heavens. It now lies rather low in the horizon in the early evening. The first star in the handle is Benetnasch the second, several degrees distant, is Mizar, near which is the star-point Alcor Alioth is the third in the handle, and i next the bowl of the Dipper; Megrez is the first star in the bowl, and Phad is the first star in the bottom of the bowl Merak is eight degrees from Phad and five degrees from Dubbe, which is the last in the bowl. The last two named are called "The Pointers," because they point out Polaris, the North Star, nearly thirty degrees distant.

The North Star is in the extremity of the handle of the Little Dipper, which curves downward toward the handle of the Great Dipper. The two brightest stars in the bowl are Kochab and Pherkad, known as "The Guards" to the pole. The remaining stars of the handle and bowl are of faint brilliancy.

Our star list for this evening is therefore No. 27, Svalozin; 28, Rotanew; 29, Alderamin; 30, Alphirk; 31, Errai; 32, Etanin; 33, Rastaban; 34, El Rakis; 35, Thuban; 36, Benetnasch; 37, Mizar; 38, Alcor; 39, Alioth; 40, Megrez; 41, Phad; 42, Merak; 43, Dubhe; 44, Polaris the North Star; 45, Kochab, and 46, Pherkad. The first two are in the Dragon the next three in Cepheus; next four in the Dragon; next eight in the Great Dipper, and the last three in the Little Dip-
